

Survey '70 Report Given

(Oscar Peterson, well-known Morrow County rancher, formerly county judge and now a member of the Port of Morrow Commission, left June 10 with 67 industrialists, Bonneville Power engineers, port commissioners and others interested in hydro and water developments. His story will appear in several installments and here's the first chapter.)

It is a pleasure for me to be along on this "Survey 70" 6000 mile flying seminar to Western Canada, Alaska, and the Arctic. It is as they call it: look, listen and learn flying tour where 67 participants from 10 different western states including Washington, Oregon, California, Arizona, Colorado, Utah and Idaho. Whereas most of the participants are engineers and leaders in hydro and power developments, a few of us like myself, are along because we are intensely interested in our water and power resources, generally conservation issues have made this survey a most timely issue just now.

It is said 70% of the water resources of the North American continent are north of the United States, Canadian border.

Our tour starts out of Wenatchee, Wn. Many of the members have their wives along. One of the first I met was a Dr. Allen F. Agnew, director, State of Washington Water Research Center of the Washington State University, Pullman, Wn.

It was most interesting to visit with him about water resources generally. He is being somewhat ribbed because of being Agnew. To me it is a feather in his cap. I have a great deal of respect for our Vice President.

Byron Price is with us. He is general manager of the Eugene Water and Electric Board. He walks with a cane. Just recently gotten off of crutches. The result of severe strain of ligaments of the right foot. In my book, Price has been outstanding because of his great interest and work in spearheading nuclear power development in the Lane County area. The county as a whole had decided upon going into this and decided upon a bonding measure, which was passed, for the preliminaries. But in last election, at a second voting, they decided upon a four year moratorium. So, while it was practically in the bag it is now out. So I think it is no wonder Byron walks with a limp.

Calvert Anderson an Executive Vice President of the Inland Empire Waterways Association is with us. Several from the Bonneville Power Administration and several from the Corps of Engineers, even Battelle Northwest is represented by at least one person. Mr. William Haney from Richland, Wn. He is manager of Water and Land Resources Planning of this nation-

ally prominent consultant firm. Yes many group consultants are represented. There are also a few of the lowly tillers of the soil and agriculture men with us. A Mr. Harold Glessner, Douglas County, Wn., wheat farmer and Port Commissioner. There are several Port Commission members present.

Going north we fly over Grand Coulee Dam and circle it. (The plan is to fly not over 1000 ft. where possible). We see some of the roughing in work in the construction of the much talked of third power house. Also the huge lake, prepared by pumping water from the Roosevelt Lake into a separate lake for Central Washington irrigation project.

Coming up into British Columbia our first stop is at Castlegar. Here we board buses and go out to the Hugh Keenleyside Dam. This is one of the three Columbia Treaty dams. The other two being the Duncan and the Mica dams. At the briefing session at the dam, a Mr. W. D. Kennedy, Manager Canadian Entity Services, B.C. Hydro and Power Authority spoke in glowing colors about the importance and fine public relations that exists between the two countries. We see the other two dams as we fly over. We arrive at Prince George for overnight. The coming having been over a somewhat rugged terrain it is not certain but that some of us suffered a bit by air sickness. Have a tour of this quite new town of some 3000 population we end the day with a banquet in the evening. Prince George is quite a new town and is called the "Spruce Capital of the north." Three large pulp mills are located here. British Columbia is a rather rugged province and 60%
