

# Ione City Marshal Injured in Accident

IONE — Mr. and Mrs. Eldon Tucker were involved in a three-day accident near Canby Saturday afternoon. They drove to Canby Friday afternoon to visit with Mr. Tucker's sister. At the time of the accident they were on their way to Corvallis to see their daughter, Tanya, installed as Grand Religion at the Grand Assembly of Rainbow Girls in Oregon.

A speeding car hit the Tucker car broadside as it entered the freeway at Canby, whirling the Tucker car around and it crashed into another auto. Both cars were totaled. Mrs. Tucker was thrown from the car, resulting in a broken nose, two front teeth knocked out, serious bruises on the face, lacerations to the hands, legs and ankles requiring stitches, and general cuts. Eldon, who was driving, received wrenched muscles in his shoulder and hand bruises. His arm is in a sling and expects to be off his job as Ione City Marshal for sometime. He is remaining in the valley with his sister until his wife is ready to come home. She will be in the hospital for several days and is in room 117 at the Willmette Falls Hospital in Oregon City.
