Educational classes were taught by Corporal Larry Novotny of Oregon State Patrol; Tom Cushman of Game Commission, Clint Jacks, Hermiston Extension Agent-at-Large, Ken Walker of Extension Experiment Station, Mr. Elsie Farrow of the Umatilla Indian Reservation and Pat Pettyjohn, 4-H leader from Ione. Forest Service classes by the USFS and astronomy class by Inez Erwin were cancelled because of weather conditions. Craft classes were taught by counselors, assistant director Kris Nelson, and Birdine Tullis. Counselors were also in charge of recreation, songs, ceremonies and nature hikes, assisted by directors.

Midori Furukawa taught the ancient Japanese art of origami (fold paper figures) to campers. She also showed slides, sang songs, and visited with campers about her country and customs, and 4-H in Japan.

On the final day parents brought potluck lunch and joined their campers for the closing of the camp.

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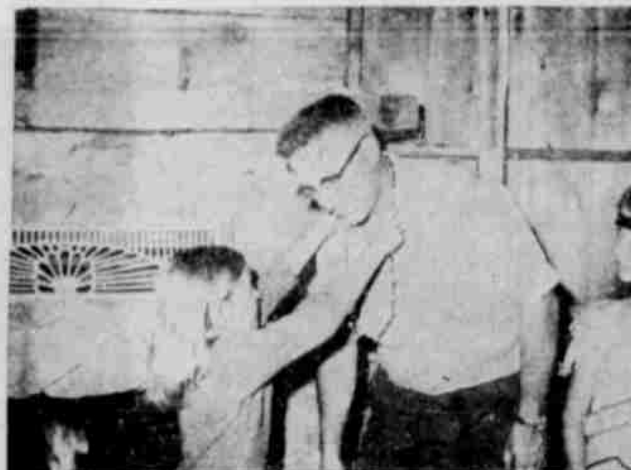
