Ione Graduate Wins Air Medal

Major Clarence L. Brenner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Brenner of Madras, has received the Air Medal for air action in Southeast Asia according to a report from the U.S. Air Force in Thailand.

Major Brenner was decorated for his outstanding airmanship and courage as an F-105 Thunderchief fighter-bomber pilot on successful and important mission completed under hazardous conditions.

The major is assigned at Takhil Royal Thai AFB with the 44th Tactical Fighter Squadron, a unit of the Pacific Air Forces, headquarters for air operations in Southeast Asia, the Far East and Pacific area.

Major Brenner is a 1952 graduate of Ione High School and attended OSU.

He was commissioned in 1957 through the aviation cadets program. He holds the aeronautical rating of senior pilot.

Social Security Benefits Paid in Morrow County

Social security benefits paid to residents of Morrow County totaled \$38,000 a month as 1969 ended, John Pasek, social security resident representative reported today.

A benefit increase, signed into law by President Nixon on Dec. 30, 1969, has since raised the monthly rate of payment by 15 percent for the 664 social security beneficiaries in Morrow County, Pasek noted.

Of the social security beneficiaries living in Morrow County, 468 are retired workers and their dependents. Another 140 are receiving benefits as the survivors of workers who have died, and 46 are getting benefits as disabled workers or the dependents of disabled workers.

Pasek pointed out that although the majority of social security beneficiaries are older people, about one out of every four is under age 60.

In Oregon

In the State of Oregon, 54,475 people under age 60 are collecting social security payments each month. The 29,955 who are under 18 are receiving payments because a working father or mother has died or is getting social security disability or retirement benefits.

Of the 5,589 who are 18 through 21 years of age, most are getting students' benefits under a provision which permits the continuation of a child's benefits past his or her 18th birthday, and up to age 22 if he or she is attending school full time.

But in this 18 to 22 age group, Pasek said, are some other types of beneficiaries, illustrating the broad family protection that is provided working people of all ages under the social security program.

Disabled Receive Benefits

A number are the children of retired, disabled, or deceased workers who became disabled before they reached 18 and who will probably never be able to work and become self supporting. The benefits of these young people, severely handicapped by physical or mental disabilities, will continue indefinitely and benefits are also payable to their mothers if the disabled son or daughter is in the mother's care.

Another small but significant group of youthful social security beneficiaries are those who are receiving social security benefits as disabled workers. Under a 1967 change in the law, disability benefits can be paid to a person who becomes disabled for work even if he has less than five years of work under social security. As little as a year and a half is required in the case of a worker who becomes disabled before age 24.

John Runyan Memorial Service Sunday

There will be a John Runyan Memorial service July 12 at the McKinley Indian Reservation at Toppish, Wn. Memorial pews, communion table and pulpit will be dedicated at 2:30 p.m.

Friends are cordially invited. John Runyan grew up in Lexington where his father had a blacksmith shop and his mother ran the hotel. He later pastored the Christian Church in Heppner and at Lexington. He spent more than 20 years working with the Indians at the McKinley Indian Reservation. He came back every year to visit friends in Morrow County and to pick up things for the Indians and the mission.

"In Memoriam: So passed John Runyan through this life as to leave a mark indelible upon each one he touched, purposely and at times bluntly. His goal was set and his passage made.

Particularly will he be remembered for his service at McKinley Indian Reservation. Here of God and sympathy for a people shored aside in the progress of time and society, dominated there 20 or so last years of his life.

The effect was such that we will often say 'I Remember'.

We cannot with many words, recitation and deeds memorialize his life that only with these few take note of what is already memorialized in hearts and lives of those he loved."
