He received a carton of 22 shells from Pettyjohn's Farm and Builders Supply for the most ground squirrels. He turned in 1285. Kinzua gave \$20 for the one turning in the most porcupines. Mr. McDaniel turned in 101.

The club gave a trophy to the member earning the most points. Bruce Bothwell was awarded the trophy.

The program which followed the presentations was given by members of the Forest Service. Frank Rasmussen and Marvin Chitty spoke on the Timber sales proposed for the next 10 years in the Heppner Ranger District and the proposed logging roads throughout the district.
