The July 18 dance will honor Princess Vivian Phillips.

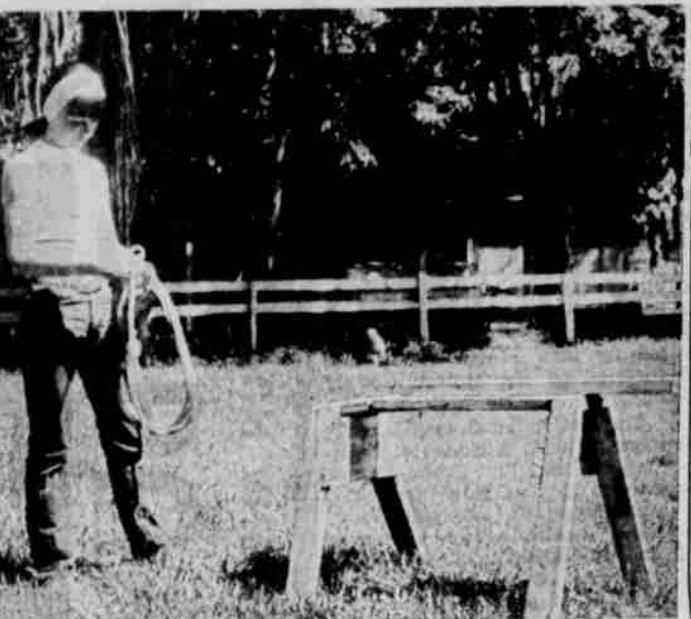
### Fourth at Ukiah

It will be placed on sale first July 9 at Portland, Me., the state's first capital. It will go on sale here July 10. Its colors will be yellow, blue, red and black.

The second stamp will be a 6-cent Wildlife Conservation Commemorative stamp featuring the buffalo, and will go on sale first at Custer, S. D. July 20. It goes on sale here July 21. Its colors will be black on tan.
