The proposed plywood mill to be built at the Kinzua sawmill site here at Heppner is not dead. Mr. Nistad said yesterday that a number of problems have been solved and that it appears that the new mill will be erected this year. To start out with, the mill will produce veneer. This will require about 33 employees. The veneer will be shipped to Omak, Wash., to be made into plywood. After complete tooling up, the program is to change so that the veneer will be made into plywood here at Heppner.

## Mike Sweeney Starts European Gov't Study

Mike Sweeney, one of the friendliest college students I have ever known, was in the Gazette-Times office Monday. He has an exciting summer in store for him that also gives him 13 hours of credit towards his Political Science degree from the University of Oregon. He will have a study of comparative governments in London, Berlin and Moscow sponsored by the American Institute for Foreign Study. Mike must not only be friendly but a good student. Recommendations for this study must come from heads of department. The study is limited to 250 students all over the United States.

He anticipates no language barrier. The classes will be conducted in English. He left Tuesday. He will fly to London for two weeks at the University of London in their School of Economics. Then for two weeks at Schiller College in Berlin. Before flying to Moscow, he will have a 4-day tour of Leningrad then on to Moscow to study at the University of Moscow.

He tells us he has been informed of places where he can't take pictures and where he can, where he can go and where he can't. He isn't to have a single United States coin on him when he enters Russia.

Schooling ends in Moscow but he flies to Paris for 4-days then to Rome for 4 more before flying back to New York. From New York he expects to spend some time in Washington, D. C. visiting his friend Kevin McDonald who is serving an internship with Senator Packwood.

He will return to enroll for fall term at the University of Oregon. He expects to complete his senior year at Christmas.

Mike is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Sweeney. He said he would write letters for the Gazette-Times describing his trip.

Farm Safety is important from a cost saving standpoint and prevention of crippling injuries, notes Harold Kerr, County Extension Agent.

President Nixon has proclaimed the week of July 19-25 as Farm Safety Week. This year's theme is "Protection — Make It Work for Safety". It stresses the use of guards, and other protective equipment, when operating the powerful machinery of today. These items include machinery guards, tractor protective frames, and crush-resistant cabs, safety belts, fire extinguishers, personal protective equipment for hands, eyes, feet, hands, and a long list of others.

No farmer can afford to not use all the protective gear he can get during these times of sky-rocketing accident costs.

A suggested daily safety emphasis: Sunday—Prepare to conserve life; Monday—Safety begins at home; Tuesday—Farm Machinery; Wednesday—Prevent falls; Thursday—Agricultural chemicals; Friday—Rural highway safety; Saturday—Recreation safety.
