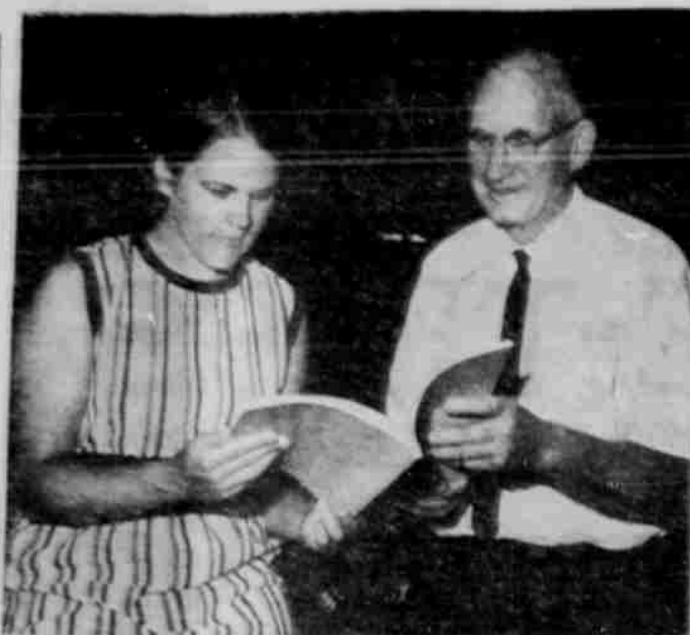

Putman Services Held

Services for Roy G. Putman who died of a heart attack were held July 23 with the Rev. Paul F. Shoup officiating and bearers were Russell Heider, Howard Heider, James Miller, Wall Rupert, Albert Fetsch and Edward Lehman. Interment was in the Willamette National Cemetery.

Roy was born May 20, 1920 in Kallspeil, Mont. He graduated from Flathead High School in Kallspeil in 1941. He enlisted in the Air Force Dec. 30, 1941 and became a Corporal. He transferred to Officers Training School and graduated a second Lieutenant at Ellington Field, Texas. He received his discharge June, 1945.

Roy and VyLette were married in Independence, Kan., on Nov. 27, 1943 while Roy was a cadet. He leaves his wife; one son, Guy Putman; mother, Mrs. Nellie Putman and sister, Pauline Johnston, both of Columbia Falls, Mont., and a brother, Robert Putman of Kallspeil, Mont.

After the war the Putmans went to Portland where Roy continued his aviation career by establishing Putman Flying Inc. He served the farmers in Eastern Oregon around Heppner as well as in the Willamette Valley. He transferred his operations to his own property in Cornelius when the Beaverton Airport was closed last year.

They moved into their new home at Cornelius about two months ago where Roy had room to put in his own airstrip and do his crop dusting from there.

Make Use of Anger

In every home occasions for angry conflict arise, whether it be the first, second or tenth year of marriage, sometimes even in the 32nd and 47th years. Anger and conflict are inevitable ingredients of any marriage. They cannot be avoided if a home is human, if love is alive and if persons are to grow.

Anger is one of man's basic feelings. It can be controlled but not denied. It is a reaction to injury, insult and disappointment. It is powerful and dangerous. Properly directed anger can lead to creative necessary change, destructive anger can destroy lives and be the downfall of a community, whether a community of husband and wife, a college, a town or a nation.

Quarrels in marriage arise over a thousand issues. How to spend the money, how to discipline the children, how to achieve sexual harmony, where to go on a vacation. The question is not whether a marriage should have disagreements but how anger can be constructively made use of.

Anger is natural. It is not sinful in itself. Sin arises in the way in which anger is expressed or directed. If it leads to lack of communication, bitterness and divorce, then it is sinful. There wouldn't be the festering sores caused by unresolved conflicts if couples learned the rules of dealing with anger. It is much healthier to express it rather than repress it.

Donald Messer lists four rules for fighting with one's wife or husband, sister or brother-in-law or with anyone with whom you are closely associated.

1. Be willing to fight.
2. Don't quit before the fight is over.
3. Avoid hitting below the belt.
4. The aim of marital fighting is not to knock out your opponent but to end in a clinch!
