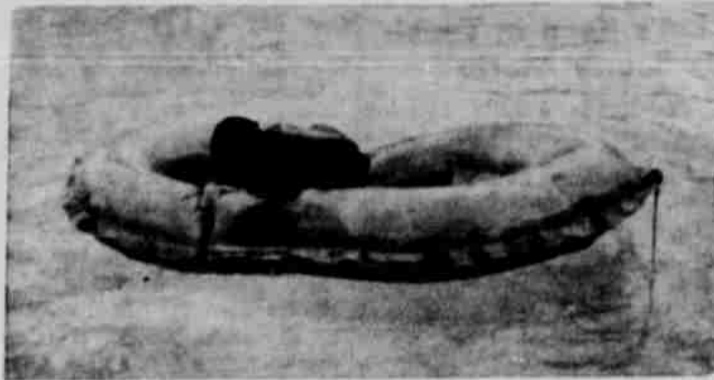
HOSPITAL NEWS
