This is just a short note to tell you that we are leaving for Koblenz tomorrow. I got to sleep two extra hours this morning because there was no school. I'm getting so I can eat boiled eggs as long as I have bread. Frau Schabo keeps insisting on cooking me one for breakfast. Yesterday, they got a steak just for me. I thought that sweet of them, but I would love to have had the breaded veal with everyone else.

The beer I haven't tried yet, but no matter how much I drink, I don't like cognac. That is the wine we have, so I drink glasses and glasses of coke.

We just got back from shopping. There is something about their department stores that seems terribly impersonal and not conducive to buying. The same with their grocery stores. Shoppers in our stores are being tempted all the time to buy things they don't need. The shelves are stocked so they are nice to look at, the building is designed to put the shopper in a receptive mood, but the stores I've been in here, are not like that. There is something cold about them as if to give one the idea that when you come in, you have in mind what you are going to buy, and if you see something you need, then you buy it, but don't look around too much. I am talking only about the larger stores though and only those I've been in.

Inge is going to work during the vacation in a florist's shop where she worked during Easter vacation. They get six weeks out of school, so the first of September it starts again. After I leave, in August, the Schabo's are all going to visit Herr Schabo's parents, both of whom are still living in the house where he grew up. His father is 97.

Then, we walked around the park, and were going to feed the ducks, but Ute forgot the bread. We were with Ute's boyfriend and a neighbor boy, and they kept talking too fast for me to understand. It is very depressing, because you don't want to interrupt and make them repeat about four times, yet you really want to know what is going on. That night we went to several discoteks. One was in Krefeld, quite far away. They play English and American songs mostly, and they play them loud.

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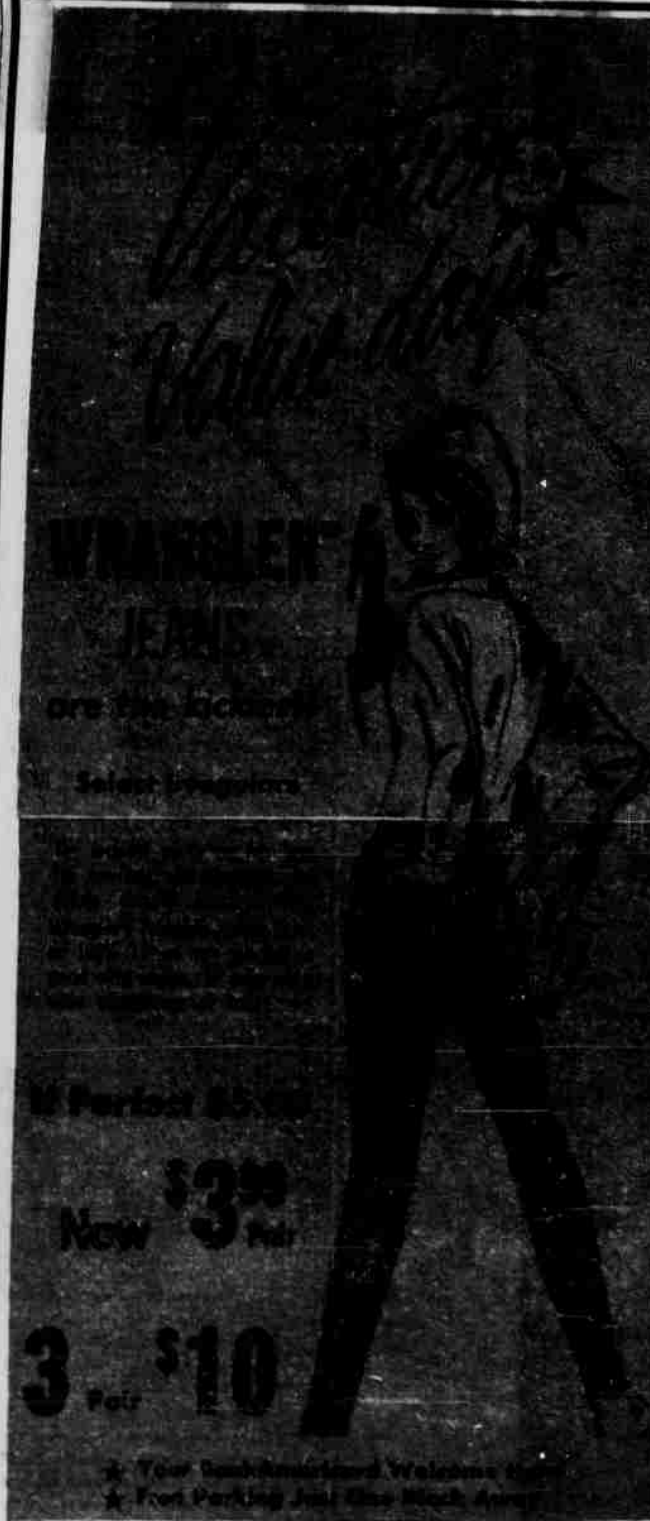
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
