Giant Tank Goes in At Heppner Elem.

Try and visualize a huge black tank, 32 feet long, 8' in diameter weighing 5 ton and capable of holding 12,000 gallons of fuel oil! Then you have the super-sized tank that was installed this week by Paul Warren, of the Heppner Elementary School. The pit, the future home of this giant, was dug just south of the present leaking tank. Monday, Paul Warren eased it into position with a Cat. The chain broke three times in the process. Finally a gentle push from the other end put it into place.

Ray Ayers made the connections from the other tank and the oil was pumped into the new tank from the old one. It was leaking 150 gallons a week.

The new tank was purchased from the Cutler Pipe Co. in Portland for \$1580 delivered in Heppner. Installation and hook-up cost about \$200. The new tank has a 25-30 year guarantee. The old tank had been in the ground 22 years.

The alternative had been to pump out the oil and seal the inside with a glass coating at a cost of \$1050, with only a 10 year guarantee. Emptying and refilling the tank would have cost \$400.

Most of the installation work was done by school personnel with Paul Warren, the "big push".
