Ultrasonic Predictable Maintenance, Inc., the new brainchild of Lowell Gribble is getting off to a good start. Since starting this system of finding faults in electrical systems such as short circuits and loose connections in buildings he has traveled over 8000 miles. This electronic detector will find electrical faults that Lowell says "we have never been able to find before." It may also be used on the bearing housing to determine the amount of noise that the bearing is producing. Thereby the approximate condition of the bearing can be determined.

**Lonerock Jail Attracts Jantzen**

**LONEROCK** — One of the attractions for Jantzen representatives was the town jail house. It was built in 1891, 12 years before the town was incorporated. The building had been deteriorating for years, when Jesse Harris and Herman Christensen decided to restore it to the days of the 19th century. They donated their carpenter work, reshingled the roof and did other odd jobs. Mr. Harris fenced the yard with rails made for fences in the pioneer days by early homesteaders.

There are now many people living in Morrow, Gilliam and Wheeler Counties who remember attending the dances at the Lonerock hall. During the prohibition days it often happened some of the gents got too much fire water and had to be locked up in the jail house. One group wasn't too happy about their lodging place and set the bed on fire. When the smoke began to pour out thru the bars, the door was opened and the prisoners made their get away while the fire was being extinguished.

When the Oregon Centennial grounds were being constructed at Portland in 1959, the management wrote to the Lonerock Council for the use of their jail house. A meeting was held and they voted to let them use the building but requested that it be returned after serving the Centennial. A delegation came up from Portland and after measuring the jail found its dimensions too wide for their truck.

The Jantzen group took over 2000 pictures while in Lonerock. The weather was ideal for their purpose. They mentioned that when they were on assignment at the coast some time ago, it was raining or foggy most of the time. The models had to spend many days in their motel rooms.
