Many Skills Unveiled At 4-H Foods Contest

Four-H Foods contests were held Tuesday at Heppner High School Home Economics room. Mrs. Lee Pettyjohn was superintendent in charge and Mrs. Frank Dyer of Mayville was judge.

Measuring Contest

The Measuring Contest is the beginning of the ABC's in 4-H Home Ec contests. There were 12 contestants. They measured flour, milk, baking powder and fat. Each contestant received \$1.00 plus blue, red and white ribbons.

Blue ribbons went to: Arlinda Aldrich and Joan Doherty, both of Ione; Sharon McCall, Lexington; Nola Steers, Becky Stillman, Joan Warren, all of Heppner; Valerie Sullivan and Rose Mesteth, both of Irrigon. Valerie received the Champion ribbon and Joan Warren, Reserve Champion.

Red Ribbons: Erin Evans and Randall Matthews, both Irrigon and Margie Vial, Lexington. White ribbon to Sherree Marquardt, Heppner.

The judge made the observation "There's a big jump from the measuring contest to the muffin contest".

Muffin Contest

Each contestant made and baked one recipe of muffins. Some chose whole wheat and some white. Each contestant was scored 50% on skill: accuracy in measuring, dexterity in mixing and handling, neatness of person and work habits. Finished product 50%: appearance, texture, flavor.

The judge noted that some of the contestants failed to sift the flour before measuring. Some muffins peaked which indicated they had been over-mixed. Some muffins showed spots of flour which showed they hadn't been mixed enough. The muffins are all on display in the main Fair building.

Blue Ribbons: Jeannie Piening, Ione Champion and Blue ribbon; Greta LaBlanc, Irrigon, Reserve Champion and Blue ribbon. Other Blue ribbons went to Kathleen Evans, Irrigon and Donna Palmer, Ione.

Red: Carol McElligott, Ione; Debora Palmer, Ione; Nola Steers, Becky Stillman, Karen Winter, all of Heppner.

For several this was their first contest.

Intermediate Cake Baking
The five participants in the Intermediate Cake Baking Contest received Blue ribbons: Lisa Collins, Heppner; Anita Davidson, Lexington; Kathy Gilbert, Ione and Reserve Champion; Joan McElligott, Ione and Champion; Pam Schmeder, Irrigon.

In this contest they were allowed 2 1/2 hours to prepare a two-course meal to include at least three full prepared foods.

Senior Dinner Contest

Marianne's menu: fried chicken, baked potato, green beans, Mini loaves of bread, coleslaw and vanilla ice cream pie with strawberries. Gene Trumbull Tells About Growing Firm

At Monday's Heppner-Morrow County Chamber of Commerce luncheon at the Wagon Wheel, President Paul Jones introduced Gene Trumbull, manager of the Heppner-Inland Chemical Company.

Mr. Trumbull explained that the Heppner-Inland Chemical Company had been in the agricultural chemical business in

Morrow County for some years.

Basically, he said, the firm works with farmers to plan type of crops to be grown, fertilizer and weed control needs.

With the advent of more irrigation, there has been the need to diversify. While the basic fertilizers formerly were nitrogen, now they are adding a number of various needed elements.

The change has required the building of a new plant facility on the Bombing Range road on land leased from Nelson-Tucker Ranches. At this new expanded plant the firm can do special blending for potatoes and other specialized crops. The new plant location is called Borlex, a combination of Boardman and Lexington.

He told about the fact that frost does not often kill down the potato plants. This means they have to use a chemical to kill down the plants so the potatoes will mature.

The company, he said, works with a number of laboratories and with the County Agent.

Investment in Heppner and Borlex plants, so far, amounts to about \$100,000. The firm has four employees at Heppner and Borlex. They expect to add another employee next year.

He was asked about the Shell Company's 12,000 acre tract of land in the North End of Morrow County.

He explained that the company had the money appropriated for development of the big tract in row crops. Then the Bureau of Reclamation came along with the announcement that they would enforce the 160 acre irrigation limitation. This hampered the company's proposed development. They spent their appropriation for other things. Now, he says, they will need another appropriation to develop the land. A team of three head the Shell Developments with their offices in San Francisco. A rumor says they might have an announcement this fall.

Next Meeting
Featured at next Monday's Chamber luncheon will be interesting slides of farming operations at the Bob Jepsen ranch. (There will not be a Chamber meeting Sept. 7 because of Labor Day).

Court Takes First
The Morrow County Rodeo Court won first prize at the Umatilla County Fair parade Saturday. They enjoyed the luncheon following the parade with the ten other courts. They were told on what basis the courts were judged: 1. cleanliness of horses, appearance of court and friendliness of girls.

Mr. Terry who now lives at Twain Harte, Calif., has graciously accepted the position of Grand Marshal of the 1970 Big Street Parade to be held here the morning of Saturday, Aug. 29, according to Randy Peterson, Parade Chairman.

Jack was Northwest champion bronco buster for the four years 1921-1922-1923-1924. And he was one of only seven men who rode "No Name" to a finish at the Pendleton Round-Up. He was one of many who got bucked off "Angel" but the difference was that Jack had one arm in a cast. It was broken over again. This was also in Pendleton.

He rode in Heppner, Pendleton, Ukiah and Union, Ore., and in Walla Walla and Ritzville, Wash.

Virgil and Albert Peterson of Peterson Bros., Ukiah, put up a saddle in 1921 as first prize of the Camas Prairie Cowboy Convention. Jack still has that saddle and is bringing it to ride in. He also has the same boots he wore then and will also wear them in the parade.

Mr. Terry stated that Jack considers this an honor he will never forget as it has made him very happy to be chosen 1970 Morrow County Grand Parade Marshal.

Harold Erwin tells us that Mr. Terry lived in Heppner for a number of years. He was a well-known blacksmith and horse shoer here and has always been very popular with everyone.

The entire County of Morrow says to Mr. Terry: "Thanks a million for being our Grand Parade Marshal for 1970!"
