Mrs. Partlow suffered bad cuts and lacerations. Her daughter, Mrs. Susan Kress, is there with her, and Mrs. Billings' daughter, Mrs. Dwight Parker of Salem, is with her. Mrs. Billings' brother, Everett Hadley, went to Missoula last week to see her. He reports her in good spirits despite her injuries. Mrs. Partlow is expected to be able to return home soon, but Mrs. Billings will be hospitalized for some time.

IRRIGON—The City of Irrigon has completed a census enumeration. Preliminary figures show a gain of 14 over the U. S. census count. This is still below the 305 number used the past several years for allocating city revenues.
