Day Care Facility In Heppner Nears Reality

The Heppner Church of the Nazarene is looking into the possibilities and trying to ascertain the need for a Day Care Center for children, ages two weeks to 13 years of age, of working mothers or other mothers of the Community who would like to take advantage of their services.

Before the project is launched, there are things to be done for State Certification. An outside play area must be smooth surfaced and fenced. There must be a crib or play pen for each child enrolled under two years of age. Aluminum or stackable fiber glass cots with plastic covered pads must be provided for each child enrolled full time in the three through five age bracket. Also there must be good sturdy washable toys suitable for each age group.

Mrs. Swinkles, the Oregon Day Care Supervisor visited Heppner last week. She said the facilities were excellent for the care of a maximum of 30 children at a time.

In order to ascertain the probable number of children in each age group and the amount of supplies needed, pre-enrollment is encouraged for all parents who want to take advantage of this new venture. Anyone interested may call 676-5529 or 676-5512 for information.

Pastor and Mrs. Everhart and several other workers will be responsible for the care of the children. The Everharts have eight children of their own ranging in age from five years to 20 years. However, at the present time, the four older boys are gone, leaving only four children at home to care for.

For all the children cared for there will be noon lunch and morning and afternoon snacks served. For those families with more than one child enrolled, a family plan will be instituted to make it more financially feasible for those with larger families.
