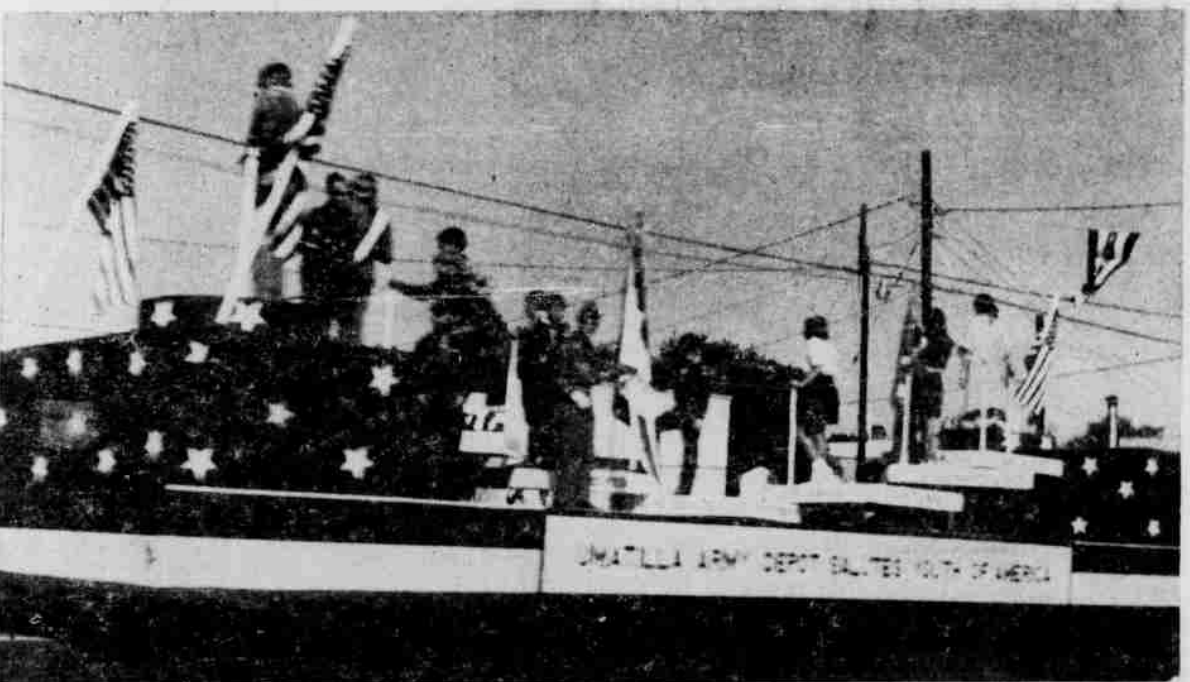

Archie Ball, Jr.

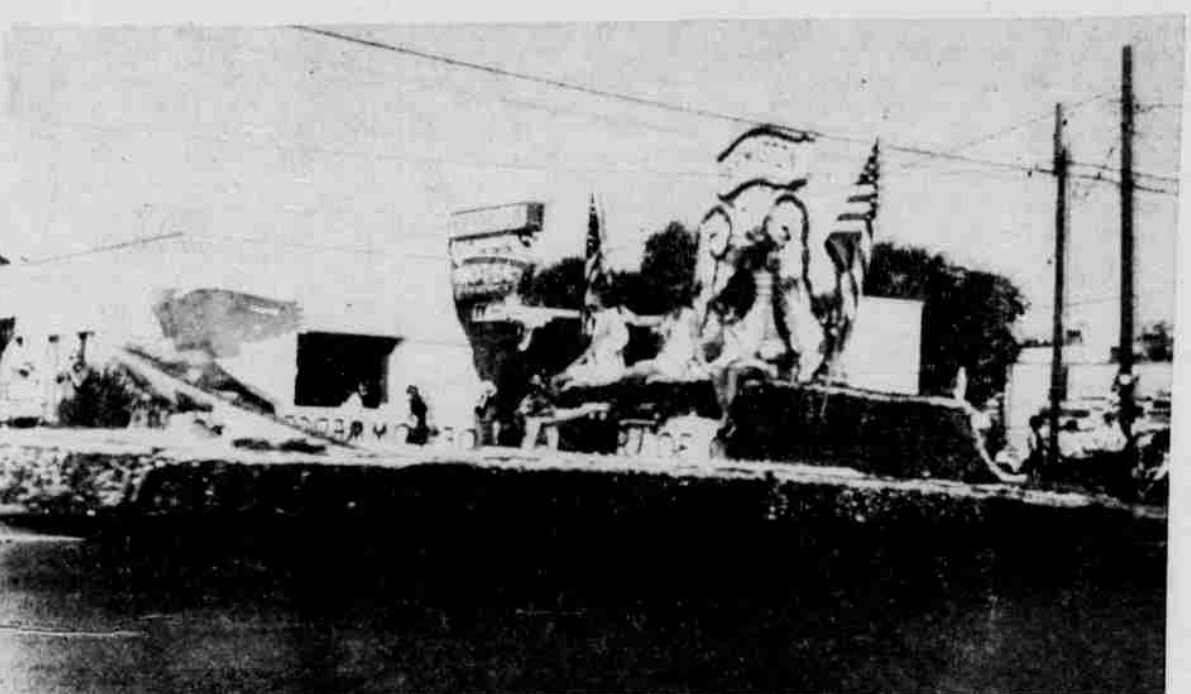
FIRST PRIZE went to the Uma-
