Lone Garden Club Has Class on Flower Grooming

The Lone Garden Club of the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc., met at the home of Mrs. Ralph Crum on Sept. 9 with Mrs. Delsie Chapel as co-hostess.

The program consisted of a report on "Grooming Flowers for a Show" given by Mrs. Harold Huber. The members brought cut flowers and Mrs. Huber demonstrated how to prepare them for

showing. Some of the highlights of her report are beneficial to anyone interested in showing flowers. Time to start grooming flowers is when you plant them. Cut flowers when the sun is not in the sky, either early morning or late evening. Cut stems as long as possible without damaging the plant. Strip leaves on the lower part of the stem. Plunge stems in 90 degree water for 1 hour and preferably 3 hours. Remove extra buds on the stem at least three weeks before cutting. Be sure flowers have four layers of petals, and look alike as to shape and size.

Taxi service to the reception will be provided at 7 o'clock from the Hotel Heppner.

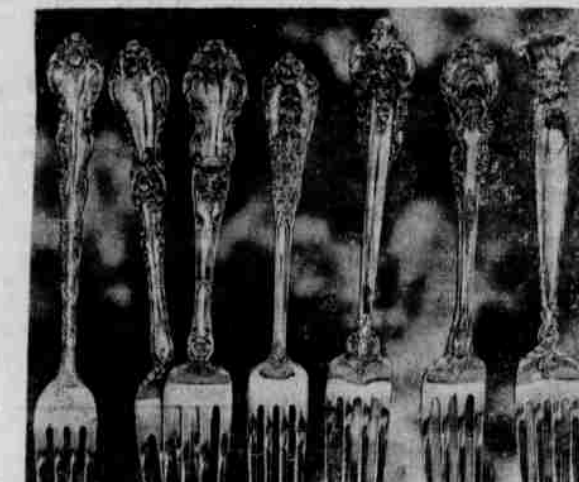
From Wyoming
