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Tribute Paid To Henry Tetz On Retirement

Henry Tetz, the an responsible for the placing of several thousand Oregon College of Education graduates in teaching positions throughout Oregon in the past 13 years, retired from his position as director of student teaching and interns for the college at the end of the summer session.

The letters that followed announcement of his decision to retire spoke of ability as a teacher, principal and superintendent of schools and of his work as assistant professor of education.

They also spoke of his companionship, hunting, fishing and golfing, and of his ability as a story-teller. Envy of his philosophy had humor show clearly through the complimentary phrases of many.

One correspondent recalled an incident early in Tetz's career in an eastern Oregon school district when, as principal, he discharged a local citizen who was working as janitor. Later, the erstwhile janitor campaigned for and was elected to the school board. In his turn, according to the letter writer's recall, he secured Tetz's removal as principal.

Tetz's abilities as an administrator and organizer were exhibited early in his life when he served as president at the Ridgefield, Washington, high school of both the student body and Boys' League in 1920-21. Soon after that, he turned to the state of Oregon for his future, attending the University of Oregon and graduating with his B.S. degree in 1925. He then became teacher of social sciences, business and physical education at Grass Valley, Oregon.

From the Pendleton High School principalship, Tetz moved into the ranks of Oregon superintendents, serving as head of the Heppner schools, Morrow County from 1948-51 and superintendent of the Monmouth-Inde-
