God's Goodness is October Neighbor Night Theme

A special invitation is extended to all friends and neighbors of the community to attend the October Neighbor Night Service at the Church of the Nazarene. This service will be Oct. 9 at 7:30 p.m. The special musical numbers by local talent will be inspirational for all who love truly good music. Following the inspirational singing, Pastor Eschert will present a slide series entitled—"God's Goodness".

Included in the colored slide series will be scenes in Southern Iowa and the Black Hills of South Dakota. Several pictures will be archeological significance to support the Bible account of the great Universal Flood of Noah's time will be shown. These include the Hill of Josiah containing an estimated 1,000 complete animals buried together by the action of water at Agate Springs, Nebraska; the Sunstone Flood tablet unearthed in the ruins of the ancient city of Sumer; and a section of the ancient wood of Noah's Ark taken from Mt. Ararat in 1955. A Fascinating named Ferdinand Navarra, sealing Mt. Ararat with his young son, reported going into a crevasse and seeing a large quantity—an estimated 50 tons—of hand tanned timber. He brought back a five foot long piece of 4 x 4 timber. In 1969 he again went to the site and brought two more pieces of wood, 18 by 4 by 5 inch as found. You will enjoy the natural beauty as well as the spiritual significance of these pictures. Refreshments will be served afterward.
