

Stubborn Forest Fire Fought

The U. S. Forest Service extinguished their fourth forest fire Tuesday morning. It was another man-caused fire, very likely caused by a hunter's cigarette, according to R. B. Cogburn. The fire was discovered Sunday afternoon between Little Potamus Creek and Gilbert Creek. It was in an area of heavy forest and had spread quickly destroying 3 1/2 acres of trees.

Other Forest Service personnel on the fire were Frank Rasmussen, Marvin Chitty, Jack Gra-

ham and Ron Jones. Later, Mat-lon Hicks, Don Kenison and Arthur Galbraith were brought in. They were assisted Sunday until about midnight by Gail McCarty and Gerald Bergstrom.

Smoke jumpers were flown to the area but high winds prevented their use. Planes dropped aerial retardant and a helicopter was used for spotting, air lift of men and equipment. Five men were brought in Monday from Dale district.

BMCC Has FCC Approval

The Blue Mountain Community College station cleared its last official hurdle today. The Federal Communications Commission has granted an FM Broadcast Station License to KRBM-FM, according to Blaine Hanks, Broadcast Department chairman.

The station, located on the campus, operated for a short time last spring under a temporary permit from the FCC. Construction began in the fall of 1969.

Operation and programming functions of KRBM are performed by students enrolled in the BMCC broadcast program. The station returns to the air Monday, October 5 with a full schedule of college events and a varied music format. At the present, KRBM will operate from 2 p.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Friday.

New Mill At Long Creek

A new sawmill at Long Creek was recently completed and is known as Blue Mountain Forest Products Co., according to Bruce Malcom, president of the firm and of Heppner Lumber Co. The new mill will saw about 50,000 board feet of lumber a day. Much of the lumber is then hauled to the Heppner Lumber Co. mill for surfacing. The local mill planer shift has increased from 5 hours a day to a full shift. Two more people have been employed here and some 14 at the new mill, in addition to about 14 in the woods and 5 truckers.
