Merlin Cantin, local Pacific Northwest Bell employee, was severely injured Friday in a car accident in the Juniper Canyon area. The phone company vehicle apparently went out of control after crossing a badly damaged cattle guard. It was stated that the car must have turned over at least twice sideways rolling along the bank. Cab was crushed. Mr. Cantin received a concussion and bad neck and shoulder bruises. His scalp was cut away from his hairline to the base of his skull so he pushed it back over his head and held it on with his shirt.

He realized he was hurt and would need help so he walked over two miles to a telephone pole, tied his jacket on the pole to make a step and plugged in his phone. The operator called John Proudfoot who brought the injured man to Pioneer Memorial Hospital for surgery. He has been reported in good condition. His doctor reported that Mr. Cantin must have passed out a number of times as he walked 4 miles to the Proudfoot ranch. Mr. Cantin is a World War II veteran, having served on a B17.

The driver said he hit a slick place on a curve and went off the road, truck being severely damaged. \$1.00 fee for copies of the zoning ordinance. Council approved the purchase of 10 copies of the Model charter at \$2.00 each. Attorney Bob Abrams suggested councilmen read the section on streets in the present city charter. The model charter gives a broad grant of power within the laws of the State and doesn't deal with specifics as the present city charter.

Elaine George, city recorder, plans to attend the League of Oregon Cities convention Nov. 8-10. She is particularly interested in attending the sessions about Small City zoning and Franchises. Council voted expenses for councilmen, councilmen elect and city officials of those able to go. Registrations will be sent by the City Recorder.

Attorney Abrams said that final signatures on a dual-release is all that is between the City and Mr. Foreman and the final settlement over the drilling of the well. The city will receive \$1000 as a final out-of-court settlement.
