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BMCC Enrollment Breaks 1,000 Mark

Enrollment of day students at Blue Mountain Community College has reached 1015, the first time the college has passed 1000 day students in its nine-year history.

The figure is an eight per cent increase over day enrollment last year, when 941 registered for fall term classes. The number is almost exactly the amount projected by the college in figures sent to the State Department of Education last year.

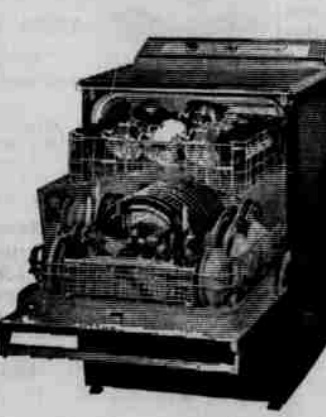
Another 450 persons have enrolled in the college's Evening school during the first two weeks of fall term, bringing the total BMCC headcount to 1465 day and evening students.

The evening enrollment is in 35 classes being offered in seven communities. Classes are being held in Pendleton, Hermiston, Milton-Freewater, Helix, Ione, Lexington and Ukiah.
