

#### Short Course For Horsemen Slated at OSU

More than 100 horsemen and women are expected to attend the annual Horsemen's short course at Oregon State University Nov. 13-15.

"All adults interested in horses, whether they have one or a dozen animals, are invited to attend," according to A. W. Oliver, OSU associate professor of animal science.

Oliver and Jim Garvison, Oregon City, are co-chairmen of the event sponsored jointly by OSU and the Oregon Horsemen's association.

Guest instructors for the event will be Dr. J. D. Wheat, veter-inarian on the faculty of the University of California at Da-vis; Mac McHugh, Diamond Bar, Calif., nationally known horse trainer and judge, and Ray West, Philomath, of Western Horsemen of Oregon.

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
