IRRIGON — A hearing was held at the October Irrigon Council meeting on a supplemental budget for the municipal water system in the amount of \$4700. The budget was adopted. There was no change in the amount of taxes to be levied as the water system is financed on a revenue basis.

Medical School Benefits Morrow County Folks

Though the University of Oregon Medical School in Portland and Morrow County are separated by many miles, there are tangible benefits for county residents from the School's many education and patient-care programs.

The education of physicians is but one of many health-related programs going on daily at the Medical Center in Portland. Two young people from Morrow County are currently enrolled in programs at the school. Susan Drake, daughter of Mrs. Doug Drake, Rt. 2, Heppner, is a senior in the School of Nursing; and Sheryl Britt, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elvin Britt, 935 S. W. Birch, Pilot Rock (formerly of Heppner) is in her sophomore year of nursing.

In addition to medicine and nursing, training programs are offered in medical technology, radiologic technology, cytotechnology (cancer cell detection), diabetes, medical internship and residency, and graduate courses leading to a master's degree in

nursing and master's and doctoral degrees in the basic sciences. Each year more than 1200 students are enrolled in programs leading to careers in medicine, nursing and the allied health professions.

Patient care services at the Medical School continue to span the state. A survey by the Oregon Regional Medical Program shows the Medical School Hospital admits, on referral from their physicians, an average of 8 men, women, and children from Morrow County yearly. They spend a total of approximately 688 days in the 14-story center attended by specialists in every field of medicine. The Neonatal Intensive Care Unit of the Hospital, where many crisis infants are flown, cares for gravely ill babies in one of the West's finest facilities for the newborn.

Last year, residents of towns in the County referred by local physicians, made 18 visits to the UOMS Outpatient Clinic for medical treatment. Here, as in all units of the Medical Center, charges are based on the patient's ability to pay, and no one is turned away for lack of funds.

Last year also, eight children from Morrow County were treated at the School's Crippled Children's Division statewide clinics. Working with local physicians, the CCD team of specialists provides the youngsters with in-depth evaluation and treatment available at a university research center.

Physicians and other health professionals from all sections of Oregon attend continuing education course on the Medical School campus to keep abreast of new advances in their fields. During the last 18 months, medical representatives from Morrow and adjoining counties have taken part in post-graduate sessions on stupor-coma, pediatrics, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, jaundice, convulsive disease, gynecology, and pulmonary embolism.

Medical knowledge is increasing at a fantastic pace. (Another new finding, another improved technique is published in a medical journal at the rate of one every 20 seconds). Recognizing the work pressures piled upon busy practitioners in the less populous counties, the Oregon Regional Medical Program is literally taking the Medical School to them. Local physicians and UOMS faculty members work together to set up circuit courses on a wide variety of topics. Enrollment for the programs held in Morrow, Umatilla and Gilliam Counties during the past 18 months totalled 105 physicians.

New Program

Although 25 per cent of all Oregon Medical School graduates are in general practice, many communities in the State are desperate for more family doctors. To help meet this increasing demand, a new residency in family practice will begin in July, training four doctors initially. Oregon citizens are becoming increasingly alarmed about the acute shortage of physicians.

Their support of a \$12 million building program now underway on the Medical School campus will allow the School to expand its entering class from the current 96 to 112 students beginning in 1972. But with the four years of medical school, a year of internship, and required military service it will be at least 1979 or 1980 before any members of these larger classes will

be practicing in Oregon communities.

Even with these additional physicians, more complex medical care for the State's growing population will demand non-M.D. health-care teams to assist the doctor. The Medical School is now evaluating new programs to train additional allied health specialists as members of these teams.
