don't care if I ever sit again. I want to get sunburned and have my nose and ears peel and then burn again. I want to ride in the saddle after lost sheep until my legs and feet feel like a part of the stirrups. I want to breathe and eat corral dust until I spit mud. I want to fight high expenses and low lamb prices.

Oh, I know I have only mentioned the bad things! I can tell you some nice things, too. I can sit with my Dad on a hillside and watch the lambs play in

the sun. I can talk to my dog, pet his slick coat and let him lick my hand. I can go to sheep camps and have a cup of jet-black coffee and a plate of beans with the herder. I can be proud when my lambs hit at a hundred pounds or better.

Not many people want to be sheep ranchers, but I do. In spite of all the hardships and the other discouraging things, I have learned to love it. I want to keep up the Krebs tradition and follow in my Dad's footsteps.
