Forest Study Draws From Four Counties

An annual event that is looked forward to every fall by the 6th grades of Gilliam, Wheeler, Morrow and Grant counties is the School Forestry Conservation Tour. Because Monument is small both the 5th and 6th grades were in the group. Gail McCarty acts as coordinator of the tour.

The event was staged at Bull Prairie where all the students were given a brief history of the Bull Prairie Recreational Development by Jack Melland of the Oregon State Game Commission and Sam Miller of the U. S. Forest Service.

After this the entire group was divided into eight smaller groups. On a rotation basis each group heard lectures to learn about forestry from the men who practice it. Each group spent 12 minutes at each station with 3 minutes to move between each.

The stations and the speakers were: Forest Soils — Soil Conservation Service by Lou Gilliam of Condon and Dale Boner of Heppner. They told how the soils are important.

Range management—Wheeler County Extension Agent, Ken Killingsworth and Lee Brooks of the Soil Conservation Service. A healthy grass plant will crowd out weeds.

Outdoor Manners — Bob Jensen, rancher. DO NOT LITTER. Fire Control—State Board of Forestry, Henry Dahill and Al Newman. They showed fire control tools and how to make water wetter with a wetting agent.

Timber Stand Improvement—U. S. Forest Service, Norman Clow. He compared thinned areas with those that had not been thinned and the difference it made on the grass and the timber.
