Possibilities Through
RC&D Told By Engineer

Gerry George, SCS engineer made a point with his Chamber of Commerce audience Monday when he told them RC&D was not a part of the Council of Government or a Federal program.

RC&D stands for Resource, Conservation and Development in the three counties of Morrow, Gilliam and Umatilla and

"It is local people recognizing local problems, using local initiative and local leadership to accomplish their community aims."

All projects originate with a local group of people. They have a community activity they want carried out. These local people take the project to one of the RC&D sponsors which in Morrow County are Port of Morrow, Morrow County Court, Boardman Soil Conservation Service and the Heppner Soil Conservation Service.

The sponsors in turn contact the SCS project coordinator, Henry C. Grabenhorst. Then the local group, the coordinator, the RC&D Sponsors and the Extension Agent meet to discuss the problem.

Ground work by the SCS Coordinator may determine which Federal and/or State Agency might be involved in the project to best assist the local people.

Federal Agencies have funds for Grants, Loans and cost-sharing that are available for local people to use in planning, designing and constructing many types of projects.

Suggested local projects might be Shobe Canyon flood control, nuclear site at Boardman, Heppner Golf course, storm drains, to name a few.

There is no additional cost for this help in solving local problems over and above the normal salaries now being paid.

The American Red Cross board met Friday evening at the First National Bank and heard John P. Schag, Red Cross Field representative, explain how the Red Cross is being decentralized in order to bring more aid to local chapters. Accompanying Mr. Schag were Margaret Lyngholm, Home Nursing of Spokane and Joe Pope, fund raising, Pendleton.

Eastern Washington, Northern Idaho and two counties of Eastern Oregon will be served from the Spokane office which is much closer than San Francisco, which formerly served this area.

The board made two reservations for the American Red Cross Aquatic School held each June. Plans are in the process to hold the school on the Larsen Air Force Base. This school could accommodate 100 registrants. Housing would be two in a room in the AFB accommodations. There is a beautiful pool on the base to use along with Airman Beach on Moses Lake for boat instruction.

The season comes earlier at Moses Lake and will be warmer than the camp usually held in northern Idaho.

The local Red Cross chapter pays for the Room and Board and cost of the course for the Heppner life guards and the City of Heppner pays the transportation.

Mr. Pope announced the Red Cross Instructors Course to be held for five nights at the Red Cross office in Pendleton beginning Dec. 2. In order to be eligible for the course, a current Advanced First Aid course must be held.

Mr. Pope indicated he would come over to Morrow County to give the same course after Christmas. A minimum of six is needed. Plans were made to check with Betty Doherty on those who currently hold an advanced First Aid card and check with them to see if they would be interested in taking the course. It was reported the Granges had asked for the course also.

Mrs. Lyngholm reported on a 30-hour course she was teaching in Red Cross Home Nursing, Mother and Baby Care and Mother's Aide in Pendleton. Linda Kahr, Heppner High Home Ec teacher, was in Pendleton taking the course. She planned to

Junior Rodeo Coming June 12-13

The first annual Morrow County Junior Rodeo will be presented here at the Morrow County Fairgrounds rodeo arena. The big event will probably be presented June 12-13. There could possibly be so many contestants that an extra show might be held one of the nights.

It is a jackpot type rodeo for 9 through 14 and 15 thru 18 year olds. There are junior classes and senior classes for both boys and girls.

A formative meeting was held at Mrs. Wavel Wilkinson's home Wednesday evening last week.

The rodeo has been approved by the Western States Junior Rodeo Assn. Mrs. Shirley Rugg is a member of the board of directors of the association. Her daughter, Jill Rugg, is a director of the senior girls.

Named chairman of the rodeo here was Darrell Dooney. Vice chairman is Jerry Schubert of Pendleton, a former Heppnerite. Secretary is DuAnn McCarty.

Entry fees for the show will be \$5 an event for the juniors and \$10 an event for the seniors. The seniors are 14 or over. It is not necessary to be a member of the Association in order to compete.

For the boy and girl juniors there will be steer dodging, breakaway roping, barrels, pole bending, girls' calf riding and boys' calf riding.

For senior girls there will be cow riding, steer dodging, breakaway roping, barrels, team roping.

For senior boys there will be saddle bronc riding, bareback riding, bulls, calf roping, team roping.

It is believed that a number of firms will be giving awards of engraved prize buckles and other prizes. The all-around award will be presented by the Ruggles Insurance Agency.

The Morrow County Rodeo committee will be helping to put on the show. A number of interested rodeo fans here in Morrow County will also be needed to assist with the big show.

The junior rodeo committee will meet again Jan. 14 to complete plans for the big event.

The annual fund raising campaign in Morrow County for the Oregon United Appeal will be launched Thanksgiving week, according to Mrs. Mary E. Gilman, Chairman and Treasurer for Morrow County.

Approximately 6,000 Oregon children are given care each year by the eleven child-care agencies included in the statewide appeal. Eighty percent of all United Appeal funds go to the budgets of these agencies: Albertina err Homes, Boys and Girls Aid Society, Children's Farm Home, Christie School, Catholic Services for Children, Waverly Children's Home, Providence Child Center, St. Mary's Home for Boys, Villa Gerard, Villa St. Rose, and Volunteers of America.

An average of the last three years finds about a dozen Morrow County youngsters under care . . . newborn babies, toddlers, or on into the teen years. An annual average of about 750 days care represents a cost of slightly over \$6,000.

In Oregon, all support for the USO comes through the Oregon United Appeal. The USO program includes off-duty recreation facilities for servicemen at bases in this country and throughout the world. Approximately 75 Morrow County boys are in the armed forces currently.
