Spartans Corral Mustangs 50-6

Rooters turned out in force at Pine Eagle Saturday at 1:00—but all in vain. Heppner couldn't get started—numerous interceptions, penalties, blocked kicks, and too many fumbles to count, added up to the Mustang defeat.

Phil Turner, Spartan fullback, hit the Mustang goal line four times and set up several more scores. His jersey was wet and soiled at the end of the game, but not enough that you couldn't see his number 11.

Turner scored first for his Spartans on a four yard run. We received their kickoff and started deep in our own territory. A pass intended for LaVerne Van Marter was picked off and run in for the TD by Turner.

We then received, or I should say didn't receive the kickoff—it was kicked short and recovered by Pine Eagle on our 40. For one of the few times in the game they fumbled—held us to four downs, and blocked our kick.

Dave Gunderson intercepted a pass and ran it back 30 yards. Heppner was held to four downs. The Spartans were also held to four downs and lost control on fourth down—Heppner fumbled on first down and lost the ball.

Pine Eagle scored next on a fifty yard halfback pass from Turner to Hult (20). This made the score 20-0. Heppner received the kickoff and was held to four downs. Wright dropped back to punt—it was blocked again. This set up the last score of the half by Hallaway (20), leaving the score at the end of the half 26-0.

Starting of the second half, the Mustangs kicked to the Spartans who drove downfield to the 35 where the Horsemen held them. Pine Eagle then punted into the end zone—first down Heppner on their own 20-yard line—fumble—first down Pine Eagle on the Mustang 20. Three plays later Hallaway scored on a seven yard run.

Wright and Hall collected while receiving the kickoff and as a result were stopped on the 18 yard line. They were held

on four downs and had to kick—the punt went to Turner who ran it back 45 yards for the touchdown.

Wright received the Pine Eagle kickoff and was hit hard by Turner which knocked the ball loose where a Spartan fell on it. Heppner held the Spartans and took control of the ball on their own 16 yard line. The Mustangs were held to four downs and kicked, only to see Hallaway score the final Pine Eagle touchdown on a 50 yard runback.

The ball exchanged hands a few times, after Heppner received the P. E. kickoff, due to a few fumbles and interceptions. Finally Heppner had the ball on the Spartan 33 yard line. Watkins fell back to pass and hit Hall (named offensive back and player of the week) who scored. The pass for PAT from Wright to Watkins was broken up. This made the final score 50-6 in favor of Pine Eagle.

Speaker

Dick Skiles of Sherman County, president of the Oregon Wheat Growers League, made the address of the evening. He told of the schedule of the state convention Nov. 30, Dec. 1-2 at the Sheraton in Portland, and told of its speakers. He also told of the National convention, also at the Sheraton in Portland January 5, 6, 7, 8.

Mr. Skiles reported that there had been no Federal grants made to provide funds for a study on utilizing wheat for alcohol fuel additives.

This had been proposed about a year ago to replace lead in gasoline as an anti-pollution measure.

He strongly recommended support of the 4-H and FFA livestock show at The Dalles, Dec. 1 is the deadline for owning steers for this show.

Wheat leaders had been called back to Washington, D. C. to obtain support for the set-aside program. He said it appears that the Department of Agriculture has become the Department of Consumers.

Mr. Skiles said emphatically that support must come from the grassroots—from the counties and states—to back the strong farm organization in order to have influence on measures pertaining to agriculture.

He concluded with the statement: "It is high time for farmers to stand up and be heard."

Trip to India

Mr. Hulse showed slides he had taken and narrated his interesting trip to the crowded Asian country.

Ione Garden Club Opens Christmas Meeting to Public

The Ione Garden Club observed Veteran's Day with a special talk on Flag Etiquette by Edith Nicholson. She said, "In displaying the American Flag, there are certain fundamental rules to follow. The matter becomes a very simple one if it is kept in mind that the Flag represents the living country and is itself considered as a living thing." Edith discussed proper ways of carrying Flag, "The union (stars on blue field) of the Flag is the honor point; the right arm is the sword arm and therefore the place of honor." Edith also told ways of displaying the Flag on staff and off staff, proper use of bunting, etc. "When the Flag is in such a condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, it should be destroyed as a whole, privately, preferably by burning."

Mrs. Ted Edelman from Stanfield demonstrated ways of using: Natures leftovers (dried pods, weeds, seeds, leaves, cones, etc.) in making wall hangings. "You use the same principal in placing materials for wall pictures as you do in arranging fresh flowers." Mrs. Edelman told the group. With the help of Mrs. Edelman, members worked on individual wall hangings.

Mrs. Martin reported the grade school children have been invited to enter poster and essay contests on the subject of "Ecology. Why Study It?"

The Ione High School students were enthusiastic and appreciative of the colorful barrels that were painted and presented by the Ione Garden Club Civic Beautification Committee. During football games the barrels are placed by the students and used to contain litter. (Students are responsible for storage, etc.)
