

Indian Benefactor Marries in Arizona

Howard Day, who Morrow County is learning to know by name, has sent Lois Winchester an announcement of his marriage in September at Window Rock, Ariz. The young couple is at home at 2237 Southeast Main in Portland.

Mr. Day is the young man who has for the past two years taken a load of useables to the Navajo Indian Reservation. Mrs. Winchester has already started next year's collection of foodstuffs, clothing, bedding, toys and books.

On the September, 1970 trip, Mr. Day was accompanied by his fiancée Maureen Easley. They distributed some of their deliveries at Monument Valley with the Seventh-day Adventists hospital, the Catholic mission at Lukachukai and the Presbyterian mission at Ganado. The high point of the trip was at St. Michaels where they passed out toys to 35 handicapped children in a special class conducted by Sister Mary Jane. She is a physical therapist who went to Navajoland three years ago expecting to stay only a short time.

Mr. Day, who is part Indian (Chinook-Clatsop) made contact with the Navajos through his association with Navajo employees of the Union Pacific Railroad. He started taking goods down after reading about the hardships the Navajos endured during a winter storm three years ago.
