Kinzua Pays Big Tax Bill

Kinzua Corporation received a record billing of \$138,811.57 for 1970-71 property taxes in the five county area of its operations. County billings were as follows:

Wheeler County	\$70,272.40
Morrow County	\$42,972.63
Grant County	\$17,230.53
Gilliam County	\$ 4,967.00
Umatilla County	\$ 3,369.01

In addition, a 5% severance tax was paid on the immediate harvest value of private timber cut during the year.

In past years, an average \$400,000.00 disbursement has been made by the Tax Commission from severance tax collections to Eastern Oregon timber producing counties—to be used as an offset against current property taxes.

The interim legislative tax committee has prepared legislation to change the method of distribution of these severance tax receipts to eliminate the current practice of maintaining a reserve account at the state level. The current year's severance taxes are in excess of one million dollars and elimination of the present reserve account would mean distribution of approximately \$1,500,000.00 to Eastern Oregon timber producing counties by July 1, 1971.

Also, legislation has been prepared to eliminate the present administrative charge to the fund by the Department of Revenue—inasmuch as no charge is made by the Department for collection of taxes in Western Oregon.

The two measures have widespread support by industry and county officials in Eastern Oregon and local area legislators have been alerted to the importance of these two measures in providing badly needed property tax relief.

Pioneer to Benefit From Hospital Grant

Heppner will be one of several cities in Oregon to benefit from a \$23,409 grant just awarded to the Oregon Association of Hospitals, according to Irene Wyman, administrator of Pioneer Memorial Hospital. The Department of Health, Education and Welfare grant, made available through the Oregon Regional Medical Program, is for the first six months of a three-year training program for personnel of Oregon health care institutions.

Funds for the project will be used to set up one and two-day classes throughout the state for the benefit of all levels of health care employees in learning new techniques and procedures. Emphasis is to be given to institutions with limited resources and teaching capabilities. Early courses will deal with emergency cardiopulmonary resuscitation and infection control.

Mrs. H. Yvonne Gardiner, formerly executive director of the Oregon Nurses Association, has joined the hospital association staff to coordinate plans for faculty and course content.
