

County Buys Used Auto Truck

The Morrow County Court held a short meeting the day following the election. Charles Acock was named to the Boardman Vector Control board for a 4-year term.

The court accepted a bid from the Woodpecker Truck and Equipment Co. for a used 1966 auto truck for \$13,000. The county has a smaller one that they will continue to use for smaller pulling jobs. The new one will be used to pull the low boy, the water truck, the new portable rock crusher. This will be a time saver and eliminate frequent hitching and unhitching.

Court decided to wait the legal opinion of the DA as to whether or not funds in excess of those budgeted could be spent for the purchase of a car for the sheriff's department.

The court accepted the bids by Don Ball and Donald Munkers for obsolete equipment as advertised for sale in the Gazette-Times, 1960 Chev for \$75 and a 1959 International Traveler \$125.

Court met with Rupe Kennedy, Gar Swanson and Dewey West of the Port of Morrow on the new Resources, Conservation and Development program in Umatilla, Morrow and Gilliam counties. The Court is anticipating help on the Penland Prairie road and Shobe Canyon.
