Land Trades Benefit Painted Hills Park

Oregon's nationally famous Painted Hills State Park in Wheeler County is to be enlarged as a result of a land exchange with the Bureau of Land Management. Archie D. Craft, BLM state director, announced issuance of title to 2,844 acres of BLM lands to the State, in exchange for a similar acreage conveyed to BLM.

State and BLM officials note that this land pattern adjustment reflects creative coordination between Federal, State, and private interests.

The Bureau of Land Management is conveying lands to the State, which in turn can trade them for CBC Ranch lands vital to the Painted Hills State Park.

One of the key tracts transferred to BLM is in the Bear Creek watershed, tributary to Crooked River and the Prineville reservoir.
