WHAT'S COOKIN'?

"Good Mornin'" Fare

She came through with her promise of sending us some Breakfast suggestions . . . that are really different.

Along with it is a strong plea to "eat a good breakfast". Skipping breakfast is frequently given as one reason many teenage girls have poor diets. A good way to help remedy the situation is with special out-of-the-ordinary breakfast menus. She says "Fix foods that are nutritious and well liked, such as cheeseburgers, even if you have never thought them to be breakfast foods."

If Thanksgiving breakfast is going to be leisurely, try this Breakfast Upside-Down cake.

- 1/4 cup butter
 - 1/2 cup brown sugar firmly packed
 - 1-No. 2 1/2 can sliced peaches, drained
 - 2 eggs slightly beaten
 - 1 cup milk
 - 1 cup biscuit mix
 - 3 cups flake cereal (oat or corn)
- Melt butter in 9x9 or 11x7 baking pan, sprinkle brown sugar over. Arrange peach slices on butter and sugar.

Mix remaining ingredients and pour into baking pan, spreading, if necessary to touch edges.

Bake in preheated 400 degree oven 25-30 minutes until top is toasty brown and crisp looking. Let cool five minutes, then turn out on serving plate. Serve in cereal bowls and offer cream or milk. Makes 9 servings.
