

National Homemaker Test is December 1

Awards including \$110,000 in college scholarships will be at stake Dec. 1, when 7 Heppner High School senior girls join 549,000 others in schools throughout the 50 states and the District of Columbia in the written knowledge and attitude examination of the 17th annual Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Girls planning to take the test are, Sarah Witherrite, Darlene Warren, Tana Rauch, Debbie Campbell, Karen Cox, Debbie Majeske, Karla Weatherford.

Chosen on the basis of test scores here, the winner for the local high school will receive a specially designed silver charm from General Mills, sponsor of the education program. Additionally, her paper will be entered in competition with those of all other school winners in the state.

The State Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a \$1,500 scholarship and, together with the winners from the other 49 states and the District of Columbia—each accompanied by a school advisor—will tour Washington, D. C., and Colonial Williamsburg, Va., next spring.

Second-place finishers in each state receive \$500 educational grants. Schools of State Homemakers of Tomorrow are awarded complete sets of Encyclopedia Britannica, Inc.

Culminating the tour for state winners will be announcement of the 1971 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow, whose scholarship will

be increased to \$5,000. State Homemakers of Tomorrow ranking second, third and fourth in the nation will have their scholarships raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000. National judging is based on original test scores plus personal observation and interviews during the tour.

Initiated by General Mills in the 1954-55 school year to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career, the Betty Crocker Search—only national scholarship program exclusively for high school senior girls—will have awarded more than \$14 million in educational grants upon completion of this year's program. During its 17-year history, almost seven and three-quarters million senior girls have been enrolled.

The test to be administered here and throughout the nation Tuesday (Dec. 1) was prepared and will be scored by Science Research Associates, Chicago, which also selects the school, state and national winners.
