Martha Campbell Baily was born at Condon Jan. 29, 1927, the daughter of Pat and Kathryn O'Brien Campbell, natives of Ireland. Her family had moved on Rhea Creek. She attended grade school at Lonerock and graduated from St. Mary's Academy at The Dalles. She was a 1948 graduate of Eastern Oregon College at LaGrande.

In 1955, she was married at St. John's Catholic Church in Condon to Truman Baily of Hanson, Idaho. They became the parents of one daughter, Jane.

Mrs. Baily has been an elementary teacher at Hermiston for the past 20 years, and also taught at Athena for two years. Her husband is the director of admissions at Blue Mountain Community College.

New "S" Club Forms For Jr. High Girls

An "S" club is being formed for the seventh and eighth grade girls of Heppner sponsored by the Soroptimists. The "S" club is a community service club and no dues will be required for members — just the girls' attendance and regular service. Each girl is expected to give about four hours of service each month, which must be planned and scheduled in advance. Planning time will usually be at the school at 12:30 on Wednesdays. It has been reported that approximately 30 girls have shown interest in this club.

One of the first projects planned for the girls is to aid the Human Resources Committee, sub-committee or Senior adults. The girls will call on residents 55 years or older at their homes for the purpose of filling out a questionnaire. The questionnaire contains information needed to adequately determine the needs in this area. Heppner will be divided in 12 sections, each volunteer and a helper covering a section.

Other suggested service areas include the neighborhoods in which girls would call on shut-ins, help with some of the operations of the Neighborhood Center, work on special community drives, and help with distributions such as food and gifts at Christmas time.

The girls may wish to work at the hospital and nursing home assisting with dinners for new patients by decorating and setting the table, serving the meal and seeing that the father can leave their children to attend. They may aid the nurses with trays or in other directed areas, help the patients in the nursing home section, assist the hospital staff with special decorations at holiday times, entertain with Christmas carols and help with simple outings.

After a certain number of service hours, the girls will earn "S" pins. The girls who serve others will be rewarded by learning new skills and by making interesting new friends. The Soroptimist Club expects to show appreciation to the girls by arranging occasional special events or parties for their pleasure.

"S" Clubs are a new venture of the Soroptimist International Clubs for business and professional women. They believe this club can become a very worthwhile activity for our girls and a big boost for the community.

What God Hath Done For Me

"Come and Hear, All Ye That Fear God, and I Will Declare What He Hath Done For My Soul!"

Here is a testimony of mine, the key of it is why we must regularly read the New Testament, one to three chapters every day faithfully, like we eat our meals thankfully. For it is exclusively and only to serve the Holy Spirit with the Bread of Life. Since I have been doing this I am much closer to God.

Every time I would read the passage in the New Testament where Jesus told the Pharisees, "if you do not eat My flesh and drink My Blood you will have no eternal Life in you." Christ Jesus was the only One of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit that took on a body of Flesh and was made from the Word not from clay. So, all I have to do is to eat up the Word and Drink in the Word by reading the Word and I have Him in me.

Every chapter in the New Testament is a meal. Jesus Christ also said, "I am the Bread of Life." St. John 14:6. When we believe Jesus Christ wholeheartedly as in very truth the Son of God. God himself gives us back the Holy Spirit that Adam and Eve lost when they quit believing God. When we believe Him we get the Holy Spirit back into our hearts as a free gift from God. We are then responsible for that Holy Spirit, just like we are for a wife and children who are living with us and for whom we care just as well as our own bodies. We naturally feed our bodies with material food, but we cannot feed the Holy Spirit that way. We can only offer Him the Bread of Life that is the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. If we neglect to feed the Holy Spirit within us regularly every day we become starved Christians. No wonder, how would our bodies be if we neglected them and fed them as irregularly and meagerly as some serve the Holy Spirit. They hardly dare to call themselves Christians they are so weak and confused. It is the Holy Spirit that digests the Word for us and reveals Him back to us in proportion as we grow in Spiritual Stature.

Note well: This tract has an enormous potential of God to benefit YOU. If you do not follow this out to its natural conclusion, you will have wasted God's tract, God's time and God's ability which in turn signifies God's material possessions, God's Eternity and God Himself. Do not forget God is Love and God is Able. And never forget to give God thanks daily for the true Manna He so freely furnished for all the word; i.e., His Word, Christ Jesus, Our Lord and Saviour. Treat His Excellency The Holy Spirit like He must be, and is, a very important Person and not just an ornament in the sky. If we but participate and trust in His faithful surity.
