Free and Reduced-Price Meals for School Year 1970-71

Increased federal funds are available this year to help provide free and reduced-price meals to students of high school age and under whose families cannot pay the full price of the meal. Lunch will be available at a free or reduced price if the family's total yearly income is at or below the levels established by the School Food and Nutrition Services, Oregon Board of Education, and adopted October 19 by the Morrow County School Board. These income levels are given in the following table:

For each additional family member, add \$450 to the income level, except that if the additional family member is in school, add \$475.

Families with incomes above the established levels may be qualified for free or reduced-price meals if special circumstances prevent the family from being able to pay the full meal price.

Application forms to be used when applying for this assistance will be sent home with students next week. They will also be available from all district school principals and from the Office of the Superintendent, Mr. Ron Daniels.

The completed application should be returned by mail or in person to the principal's office in the school the child attends. District principals are as follows:

The school principal will review the application and determine on the basis of the information given if the family qualifies for free or reduced-price meals. If the application is not approved, the family may appeal the decision. Request for an appeal hearing should be made in person, in writing or by telephone to the Office of the Superintendent. The hearing will be scheduled for a time convenient for both the family and the hearing official.

No written application is required from families receiving abundant foods or food stamps. An adult member of the family must notify the school principal that they are receiving this public assistance and the principal will confirm the information with the county welfare office and certify the family's eligibility.
