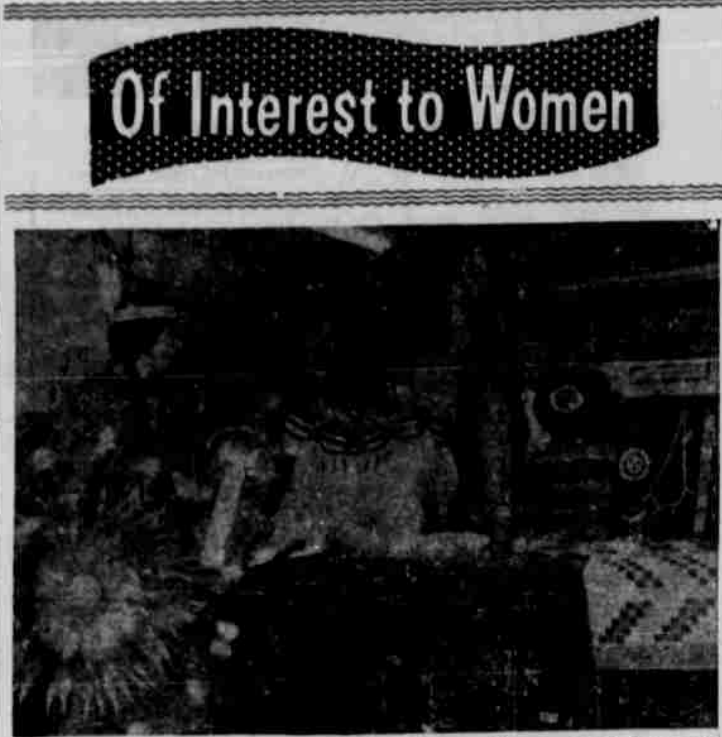

**Heppner Extension Units Learn Indian Culture First Hand at Meeting**

Honor guests at the Heppner Extension Unit meeting Monday were Mrs. Louis McFarland of the Umatilla Indian Reservation and Mrs. Gordon George from the Umatilla County Extension office. The group met at the home of Mrs. Norman Clow for a Christmas exchange and pot-luck luncheon.

Mrs. McFarland showed and told about making a buckskin outfit for her husband and showed one that he had made for her. She brought with her other beaded work that she had made. She is working to revive the

crafts of her forefathers for herself and to teach them to her children. One of the long-forgotten crafts is the tanning of the hides. One step which amazed her audience was soaking the skins in brains to soften it.

**Reservation History**  
In 1855 when the treaty was signed the Umatilla Indian Reservation was 25x30 miles in size. Various pieces of land have been sold and the reservation has been reduced to 18x14 miles. There are 1200 registered in the Federated tribes and 900 living on the reservation. A baby can be registered at birth if the child has 1/4 tribal blood. Tribes are Walla Walla, Umatillas and Cayuse.

The Reservation was a full agency when it started and then in 1957 it was a sub-agency under Warm Springs. This was unsatisfactory and again it is a full agency.

The Indians are anxious to help themselves and are working to improve communications within the Federation. They are trying to improve the health of the Indians and develop job possibilities.

They are trying to develop an awareness of their Indian heritage and encourage the members to learn and teach the bead work, the weaving, the root gathering, the games, the language. There is a possibility for the manufacture of a back pack unit for Snowmobile use.

Mrs. Gene Ferguson and Mrs. Alice McCabe took the lesson training for the study of the Indian Culture. The ACWW study is always given in December. It is traditionally devoted to a study and understanding of some foreign country or a part of our own country. An Indian woman has visited each unit in the county at the time the study was given.
