A couple of outstanding specials plus a full complement of delightful daytime programs are scheduled for children of all ages during the holidays over KOAP-TV, channel 10, Portland and KOAC-TV, channel 7, Corvallis.

Young viewers and adults too will enjoy the NET Opera Theater production of "Hansel and Gretel" Sunday, December 27 at 10 p.m.

Humperdinck's musical version of the fairy tale about a wicked child-baking witch and the children of a poor broom-maker will star contralto Maureen Forrester as the witch. Judith Forst plays Hansel and Christine Anton is Gretel, the two youngsters who thwart the witch by popping her into the oven.

"Dandelion," Monday, December 28 at 8 p.m. and again Wednesday, December 30, 5:30 p.m. is a NET Children's Theater special which has the Paper Bag Players guiding young viewers through a fantasy based on the theory of evolution.

Headlining the daily Monday through Friday offerings for children on the Oregon Educa-

tional Broadcasting stations during the Christmas season will be a continuation of the award-winning "Sesame Street," with three showings daily — 9 and 11:30 a.m. and 4 p.m.; the popular "Misterogers Neighborhood" at 10 a.m., and 12:30 and 5 p.m. the week of December 20 and 10 and 12:30 the week of December 27; and "Kukla, Fran and Ollie" with Fran Allison and the Kuklapolitans Tuesdays at 7 p.m. with repeats Thursdays at 5:30 p.m. and Fridays at 3 p.m.

**OSU Specialist Advice on Christmas Trees**

Before you buy that Christmas tree, choose the spot where it will stand.

Can the tree be placed away from the fireplace, the television set, the radiator, furnace register, or other sources of heat? Will it block a stairway or exit? Is there an electric outlet nearby for connecting the string of lights?

With the size and shape of tree to fit the space in mind, you're ready to go shopping.

Gary Sander, Oregon State University Extension forestry specialist, offers some guidelines for selecting a fresh healthy tree:

Gently pull the needles at the end of a branch. Bend them. The needles of a fresh tree will be firmly attached and pliable.

Rub your fingers across the stump. It should be sticky with resin.

The tree should be clean, free of moss, vines, or other foreign material. Foliage should be natural-appearing, free from insect or disease damage.

When you bring the tree home, Sander advises, cut at least an inch from the stump. If possible, cut at an angle to allow absorption of more water.

Place the tree in water immediately. If you're not ready to put it up, store it outdoors in a protected area.
