WHAT'S COOKIN'?

I tried about five new recipes for Christmas. Some of them I want to make again. This one for Butter-bright pastries I got from the Farm Journal says "They'll be the hit of the holidays" . . . and they were.

No matter how you shape or fill them . . . they're good. Next time I'll use more salt than the recipe calls for because I use oleo instead of butter.

Butter-Bright Pastries
2 pkgs. dry yeast dissolved in 1/4 cup warm water. Add 1/3 cup sugar, 1/8 tsp salt and 1 cup cold milk.

Beat in 2 cups flour. Add 2 eggs, beating well. Stir in enough flour to make a soft dough (about 2 cups). Cover and refrigerate for 15 minutes.

On a lightly floured surface, roll dough into an 18x15 rectangle.

Cut 1/3 cup butter into small pieces and dot surface of dough with butter, leaving a 1" margin. Fold 18" side into thirds and then fold 15 inch side into thirds. Wrap in floured aluminum foil; chill 15 minutes. Repeat procedure twice using 1/3 cup butter each time. Chill a final 15 minutes.

Dibide dough into fourths. Roll and cut into desired shapes. Let rise until doubled. Bake at 400 degrees eight minutes or until golden.
