## Consultant Meets With Irrigon Council

IRRIGON — Rodger Budke, planning consultant for Cornell, Howland, Hayes, Merryfield & Hill, met with a joint Council and Planning Commission session in Irrigon Jan. 11.

The firm is completing the third phase of a comprehensive planning study for Morrow County prior to adoption of a County zoning ordinance. Counties are required by law to have completed such a plan and have implemented it with a zoning ordinance prior to Jan. 1, 1972.

The purpose of Monday's meeting was to inquire into changes that might be indicated for the local comprehensive plan adopted in 1964. These along with plan changes of other communities, will then be considered for incorporation in the final County plans.

**Irrigon Councilmen Given Oath**

At the January session of the Irrigon City Council, the oath of office was taken by Dorothy Irish, newly elected Council member and by Chester Wilson who was re-elected to a Council position. The other re-elected member, Felix Friend, was absent.

Since the charter requires all members to be present when balloting for the mayor position from among elected Council members, this election was deferred to a later meeting. Appointment of a Recorder also requires a full Council and was deferred.

Rita Clark of Clarks One Stop Grocery, appeared before the Council with request for approval of renewal of a class B liquor license application. Earlier request was delayed because the store has been closed for several weeks during the Clarks absence from the community. It is to reopen now. The application was approved.

In other business the Council was informed that the grade crossing construction at 10th Street, across the Union Pacific

tracks had been approved without a hearing, since all agencies involved had given their sanction. A permit has been issued by the Public Utility Commission of Oregon covering the crossing. This crossing will give direct entrance to the park on the Columbia River.

**4-H Sees Wildlife Film**

A wildlife film "So Little Time", was shown to about 40 boys and girls at the 4-H Community Club Jan. 14, by Lee Hoskins of the Fish and Wildlife Bureau.

Mr. Hoskins said that many birds and animal species are near extinction because man has moved in and destroyed their range or natural habitat, not always purposely but simply by man's need for more room. Illegal hunting, or over-hunting, indiscriminate use of insecticides has also brought about a decline of wildlife. He told the youth group that in a few years it would be up to them to protect and preserve the wildlife. That possibly in the future hunting would not be allowed. He suggested watching and photographing the ducks and geese in their natural wildlife area between Irrigon and Boardman on the Columbia River.

The next meeting of the 4-H community club will be Feb. 11 when Irvin Bushby of Umatilla will show slides of insects, birds and animals of the local area. There will be an election of officers, at this meeting.

## Kinzua Looks to 1971

Kinzua Corporation looks toward a more active participation in Grant County's economy in 1971. Our 60,000 acre tree farm in Grant County will receive more intensive management as a result of programs now under construction. Completion of a new green veneer plywood plant at the company's mill in Heppner will mean the commencement of logging operations on the Rudio Mountain property. A new logging company will be formed in Grant County and their equipment and personnel will be oriented towards more esthetic logging practices that will preserve recreational and watershed values.

In 1970, intensive range land development took place on the Rudio Mountain property in cooperation with the Monument Grazing Association. Heavy equipment was assigned to develop fifty-four stock and fire protection ponds, roads were improved and a new eight acre lake was constructed. Investigation is now underway on the type of land lease that would be attractive to local area residents enabling them to construct summer homes on Rudio Mountain.

Starting in January remodeling work will be started on the inside of the Kinzua Mercantile. These changes are intended to brighten up our store and make it more efficient in its operation, with you the customer in mind. During this period things will probably be in a turmoil and things not where they use to be found — but bear with us and we thank you for your cooperation.
