Ione Cardinals See Weekend Defeat

Weekend games for the Ione Cardinals included Riverside on home court and Cascade Locks at Cascade Locks.

On Friday night, field goal attempts were led by Riverside with 25 out of 70 while Ione was close behind with 22 out of 67. The statistics continued to be close at the gift line with Ione canning 14 of the 22 attempts and Riverside 16 of 27. The winning difference for Riverside was their 43-40 edge on the boards and Ione's 20 turnovers to Riverside's 15. Cardinal Dick Snider led all rebounding with 15, had 5 assists and as high scorer with 18 points. Final score was Ione 58 to Riverside's 68.

Saturday night saw the Cardinals defeated by a wider margin, 71 to 48. David Warren led in the rebound department with 14, while Clint Krebs had 5 assists. Snider again scored highest for Ione with 25. Unfortunately for the Cards, Cascade Locks led on rebounding with 57-44. Coach Eugene Dockter said, "We played good ball the second half but had a poor second quarter. They shot better than 40 per cent and Ione shot a cool 25 per cent."

College Improvement Requests Approved

The Oregon State Board of Higher Education has approved several curricular and institutional improvement requests.

Eastern Oregon College
Eight recommendations for curricular changes were approved for Eastern Oregon College. They include:

—Revision of the master's degree program for secondary teachers. The revision phases out two existing degree programs in secondary education designed primarily to improve a student's subject matter background for teaching and emphasizes work in education. The program will help develop performance-based master's degree students who can demonstrate to employers refined skills in the teaching profession.

—Revision of BA and BS degrees in General Studies. All candidates for a degree in General Studies will be required to complete the revised institutional requirements for the BA or BS degree. This includes a minimum of 72 credit hours of work in upper division courses with a 2.0 grade point average.

—Addition of three new BA or BS degree programs—in physics, chemistry and business and economics—effective next fall. The new programs will help serve students who complete lower division work in an Eastern Oregon community college and who may be interested in a bachelor's degree in the Eastern Oregon region. The changes are expected to attract new students to EOC, thereby increasing the efficiency of operation of the institution.

—Approval of naming the proposed College Center at EOC in honor of the late Mac Hoke. Prior to his death June 19, 1965, he devoted much of his time and talent to Board matters, particularly in the areas of finance and agricultural extension.

OTI
The Board also approved development of a college transfer

program at Oregon Technical Institute. The program authorizes OTI to enroll students in college transfer programs to the extent that it can serve these students within its budgeted capabilities and facilities.

ORE
Oregon College of Education was authorized to offer concentrations in biology, mathematics and psychological studies to bachelor degrees in General Studies, and preliminary plans for alterations and an addition to the College Center were approved. Legislative authorization is being requested for the College Center this year so architects may complete the design development phase of planning. Total construction budget is \$1.57 million which includes \$950,000 for alterations and \$620,000 for the addition.

SOC
The State Board approved a certificate program in Fine Arts in Theater at Southern Oregon College. The program extends SOC's resources in theater to serve interested students not now served in programs at the college.

Three Strive for FFA State Farmer Degree

Three from the Heppner FFA chapter went to Boardman for the formal interviews for the State Farmer Degree. The three are Sam Bellamy, senior and Ted Bellamy and Kirk Robinson, juniors.

Hal Whitaker, advisor said they hoped to announce the State Farmer Degree winners by the annual FFA banquet to be held Feb. 23.

Morrow Gets Highway Money

The Oregon State Highway Commission has announced distribution of \$5,626,352.50 in highway-user tax funds to the 36 counties.

Allocation is based on number of vehicles.
Morrow County received \$9,455.62 and has 4,390 vehicles.
