Boardman Council Hears Future Plans

BOARDMAN — Deputy State Fire Marshal, Richard R. Small of Pendleton, met last week with the Board of Directors of the Boardman Rural Fire District and the city council to discuss a joint working agreement with the city. Members of the board include Carroll Donovan, Charles Acock, Delmer Hug, Willard Baker and Arnold Hoffman. Mayor Dewey W. West, Jr., appointed Fire Marshal Zearl Gillespie and Fire Chief Larry Phillips as a committee to work with Hug and Baker to formulate proposals for the agreement. A discussion was held on the equipment needed to meet the requirements of the Oregon Insurance Rating Bureau to qualify for insurance rate reduction. In other action those at the meeting heard Walter Karnopp and son Dennis of the Eastern Oregon Telephone Company of Pilot Rock tell of a new tower and equipment being installed at Boardman for a mobile telephone service. It will be completed in the near future.

Mayor West welcomed Morrow County Judge Paul Jones of Hepner, and County Commissioner Walter Hayes of Boardman to discuss local administrative government and a new proposal to form a new administrative district based on county boundaries.

Mayor West appointed the following department heads: Walter, Ronald Black; park, Wally Hendrix; police, Vernon Russell; fire, Zearl Gillespie; sanitation, Joe Tatone; streets, Cecil Hicks. The council voted to adopt the state schedule of holidays, and the city hall will be closed on those days.

The Urban Renewal Agency approved sale of lots 5 and 6 in block 6, west Boardman, to W. E. Nelson.

The Boardman Planning Commission met and granted approval of the plans of Nelson to construct an apartment complex in lots 1 and 2, block 2, north Boardman. It will consist of two four-plex, two three-plex, and four duplex. The four-plex will be two story, the rest single. There will also be two swimming pools.

Homemaker Award Winner

Lynel Braat, Riverside High School senior, has been selected as the 1971 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow. She was chosen for her performance in a written knowledge and attitude examination administered to senior girls Dec. 1 1970. She will receive a specially designed award from General Mills, sponsor of the annual education program. In addition, she is now eligible for state and national honors, including one of 102 college scholarships totaling \$110,000.

The national first place winner—the 1971 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow—will receive a \$5,000 educational grant. She will be chosen this spring from 51 Homemakers of Tomorrow representing each state and the District of Columbia at the close of an expense paid educational tour of Washington, D. C. and Colonial Williamsburg, Va. Each of the state winners will be accompanied on this tour by a school advisor. Second, third and fourth place national winners will be awarded \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 scholarships. The oth-

er state Homemakers of Tomorrow will receive \$1,500 grants. State judging centers on scores of school winners in the Dec. 1 test, with personal observation and interviews during the tour added factors in national selections. Second-ranking winners in each state receive \$500 educational grants. The school of every winner receives a set of Encyclopedia Britannica from Encyclopedia Britannica, Inc.

The Betty Crocker search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow is the only national scholarship program exclusively for high school senior girls. Begun by General Mills in the 1954-55 school year to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career, it will, with the 1971 grants, have awarded more than \$1,750,000 in scholarships during its 17 year history. This year's enrollment of 650,000 senior girls brings total participation since the start of the program to almost seven and three-quarter million.

4. Location of tick on animal;
5. Name and address of collector.

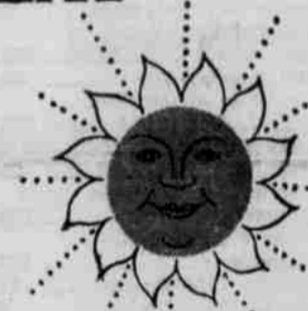

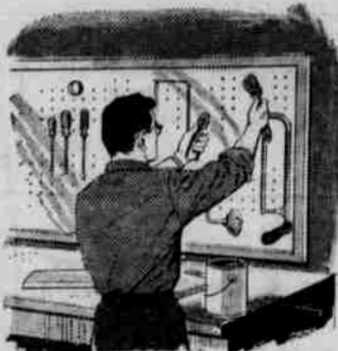
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
