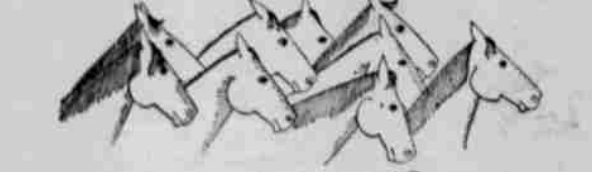
Sheriff Mollahan noted the arrest of a Heroin addict in the north end of the county for an armed robbery he was attempting to support his addiction.

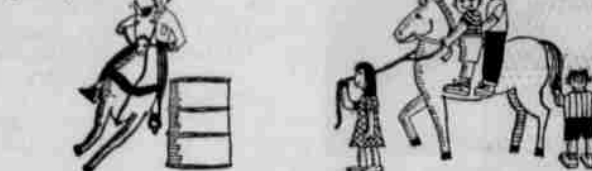

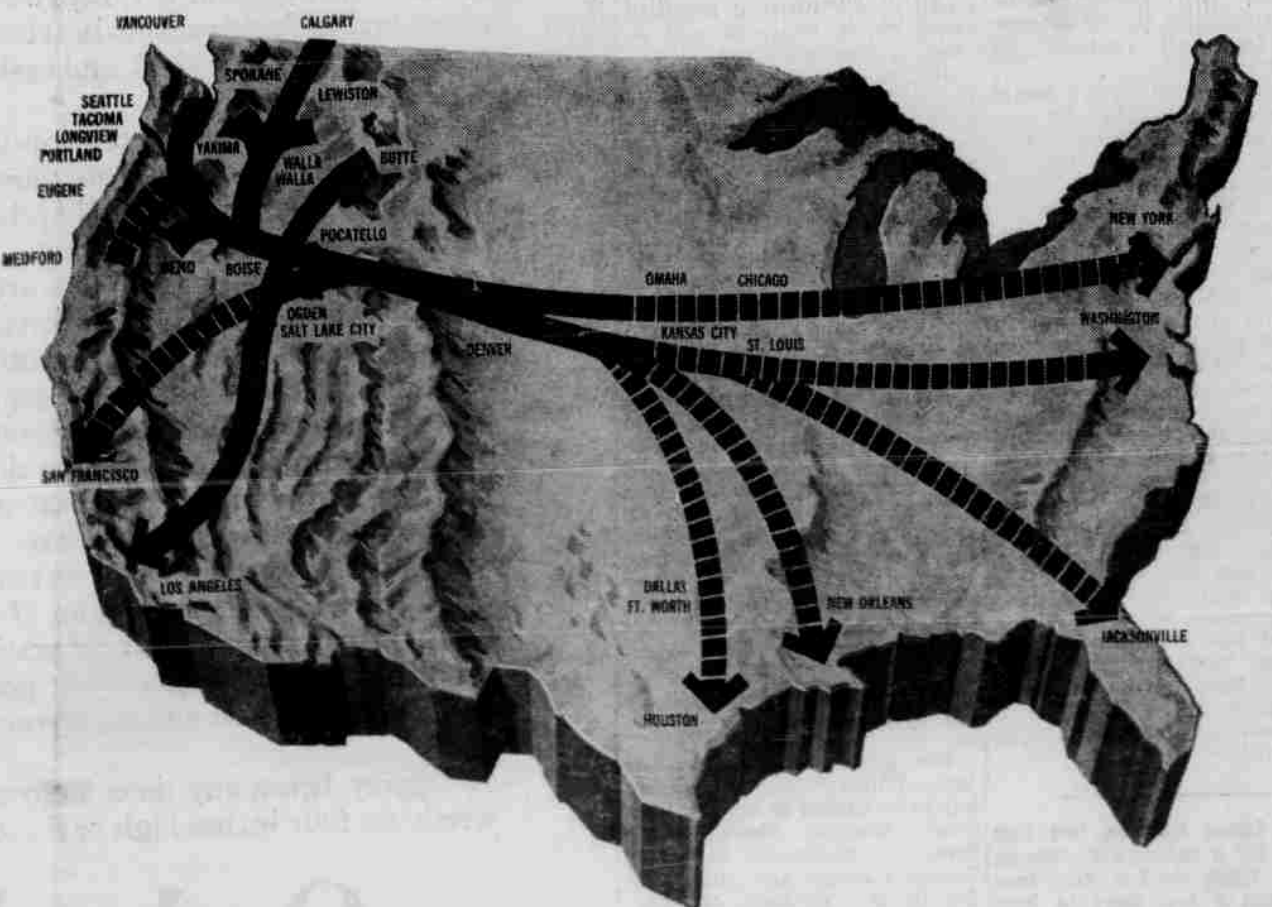
