

Warren McCoy Cited By Irrigon Council

IRRIGON—Warren McCoy was cited for outstanding community service, in a short ceremony at the February Council meeting Tuesday when he was presented with a plaque.

The last of the original 6 Council members to leave office, McCoy had served continuously for 14 years since the City was incorporated in 1956.

The presentation was made by Mayor Chester Wilson, who read a letter of appreciation signed by each of the Council members and recorder.

Mention was made of other services to the City, namely Mayor pro-tem, police commissioner, street commissioner, delegate to the City to Convention of General Contractors, and delegate to the City to the League of Oregon Cities Convention in both 1969 and 1970.

Besides his City interests Mr. McCoy has served as a member of the school board and on the school advisory council.

In other council business a request was read from Wayne Hodson of Water West of Oregon, for use of the City Service Building for a shop and storage while work is being done in the area. The request was denied as the building is presently being used by the city and the council felt it would not be to the city's best interest to rent it at this time.

Budget members appointed were Gayle Shoemaker and Warren McCoy for 3 year terms. La-Velle Partlow was named for 1 year to fill Dan Creamers position, as he is out of town. Other committee members are Hubert Senn, Joe Irish and Billy Griffin, with Fred Walker as an alternate. A budget officer will be appointed in the March meeting.
