The CPL (Committee for Progress through Law) is a new committee being set up in CAA's to help people work at their relationship to their government, particularly their state legislature. It should help stimulate people to register and to vote, and to set up local priorities for legislative concern.

Gun Control Bill Told

Arthur Hollowell, one of two guest speakers at a special meeting of the National Assoc. to Keep and Bear Arms, explained the gun control law to be introduced in the 1971 legislature.

Hollowell went on to show how other countries have allowed their governments to impose gun control on the people and its effect.

Hollowell also attacked the Oregon Criminal Code Revision saying if it is enacted it will der the new code there will be no such thing as Justifiable Homicide.

The second speaker at the meeting was Russell Struve, a director of the newly formed National Justice Foundation of America, an organization offering legal council to any citizen or organization that may have their rights denied to them, such as returning prayer to the schools for those districts that have a majority wanting prayer returned to their schools.

Ron Britner, chairman of the Morrow County arm of the National Assoc. to Keep & Bear Arms thanked the guest speakers for coming and thanked the 35 people in attendance for coming to hear the speakers.

President Nixon Lauds Farm Production Record

President Nixon recently praised American farmers for providing this country's people the best food in the world at a lower percentage of family income than is provided for any other country in the world.

He cited the fact that the area of the American economy that has had the greatest growth in productivity is American agriculture, and said this has not been adequately reflected in agricultural income.

This report on the President singling out American agriculture for high praise was supplied by Walter E. Erickson, Chairman of the Oregon State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

In his remarks, President Nixon referred to the new Commission on Productivity, with a membership of top leaders representing American industry, labor, the academic community, and agriculture, saying that "a very significant point was made, not only in the first meeting, but in the second and third. On every occasion, it was this: That that area of the American economy that has had the greatest growth in productivity and that has the highest productivity per man hour, anyway you want to rate it, is American agriculture."

Upon hearing this fact, the President said he checked further and found that "we are the best fed people, but at the lowest cost, the lowest percentage of our income, of any country in the world. And for that, we are most grateful."

This fact, he said, "means that the Nation owes American agriculture a very great debt, which perhaps has not been adequately reflected in agricultural income."

Mr. Nixon continued, "I am not happy about the fact that agricultural income has not been at the rates that it should have been over the past few years. I think the farmer deserves a fair share of the Nation's increasing wealth and its increasing productivity, due to the fact that American agriculture is so productive."

At the same time, Mr. Nixon said, "We have problems of hunger in this country, and there are problems of hunger in all countries, rich and poor, around the world."

"But the problem of hunger in this country are, in terms of magnitude, nothing compared to what the problems are in countries that simply do not have the enormous productivity that we have."

"And so, as we look around the world and as we think of the future of the world and what is going to happen, we realize how much American agriculture can contribute."

The President said he referred not only to export markets but to "the knowledge that we are able to share with other people which may make a difference in these next 10, 15, 25 years, a difference as to whether millions of people all over the world will grow up without enough to eat at all, or whether they may have a better chance than they would otherwise have to survive."

In the course of his remarks President Nixon had high praise for Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin, saying that "when I appointed him, I wanted a man who would speak for the farmers and for American agriculture to the White House rather than the other way around. He has done that. Beneath that very pleasant and disarming exterior of his is a very strong and persuasive and determined mind. And in these matters that come before us and the high decisions that have to be made at the White House with the legislative leaders, in the cabinet, on the budget and other matters, I can assure you that agriculture has a very strong advocate."
