Michael D. Bengé Still Missing

Here is Michael D. Bengé, son of Mr. and Mrs. Terrel L. Bengé of Ione. Mike is one of some 50 from Oregon who are missing or are prisoners of the North Vietnamese.

Mike had worked with the Montagnards in the Central Highlands of Vietnam for about six years. He was highly thought of by the mountain people and was honored many times. He was even "adopted" by a native chief there.

Mike was missing early in February of 1968 after a Viet Cong attack on Ban Me Thuot, Vietnam.

A fair flood of letters to Han-oi has been received in Portland and have to be sent to the North Vietnamese. More are being sent.

If you are concerned about the treatment of these prisoners, and if you wish to write, we understand folks are advised to ask for full identification of prisoners held, humane treatment, mail privileges and international inspection of the camps.

Letters should be addressed to Office of the President, Republic of North Vietnam, c/o POW's, P. O. Box 30, Portland, Ore. 97207.
