### FACTS SHEET—DIABETES

Diabetes, which ranks seventh in the list of causes of death by disease, is a chronic condition which develops when the body cannot make use of certain food elements, especially sugars and starches. Diabetes can be fatal unless properly treated.

It is estimated that one American in every 50 has diabetes, and that there are approximately 4,000,000 diabetics in our country today. Of this number,

about 2,400,000 know they have diabetes, and about 1,600,000 are still unaware of their condition.

Approximately 5,600,000 additional persons living today are potential diabetics — meaning that they will develop the condition some time during their lives. At least 250,000 new cases of diabetes are now being diagnosed per year in the United States.

Diabetes runs in families. Of the total population of the United States, one out of every four persons — nearly 50 million people — are believed to be capable of transmitting diabetes to their offspring. Most "carriers" of diabetes are themselves free of the condition.

March of Dimes experts warn that a major German measles (rubella) epidemic could increase the number of defective births in this country alone by 20,000 to 30,000.
