 Twelve meets have been scheduled for this year with the district meet on May 15. There is a better turnout than last year already, and the first practice will be March 15.  
 John Boyer, one of eight Fresh out will try his luck at the 440 yard run. The rest of the first year trackmen don't know yet what they're good at or the event they like.
