Garden Club Hears Pruner Expert

John Schaad of Pendleton came over Monday to give a pruning demonstration for the Heppner Garden Club. As he pruned a peach tree at the es bear on one year old wood. p.m.) Prune the old growth that has lost its vigor to promote vigorous growth of the new wood. Always cut just above the leaf bud you wish to take the lead. Never leave a stump. Because no bud to draw the growth, the stump will die and the dead wood will extend into the branch.

In demonstrating how prune an apricot tree, he explained the fruit is born on 2nd year wood. The ends need to be tipped and all limbs with conflicts need to be trimmed back far enough to avoid the conflict so that each limb has its own area to grow.

He explained that certain limbs could be left on for fruit this year but would come off next year. He also demonstrated pruning gooseberries and rose bushes

Mr. Schaad is a versatile gentleman. He was president of his fraternity. Alpha Gamma Rho. at Oregon State. He was the Vowoodburn before becoming agricultural consultant for U. National, who transferred him

to Pendleton. He is now special representative for Grange Mutual Life Company.

The Olivett pie cherry is very red. He favors the Moorpark Apricot and Conley Red raspberries for flavor. New apples are Galer and Jonadel.

He recommends the Seymour Smith clippers, Atkin No. 20 pruning saw and a Diston Tiffany loper.
