

Riverside's FFA Instructor Talks On Curriculum

Riverside's FFA instructor, Ron Black, has been preparing the boys on the Columbia for careers in agriculture for 28 years. He is delighted with the new facilities at Riverside even though there are a few things he is eager to have changed. Sawdust from the saws is vacuumed and transported by pipeline to the central cleaner. This is noisy and he anticipates having the cleaner moved from the room this summer.

Class Work

The Freshman students in Voc-Ag have a combination of class work and shop work. They study all phases of livestock operations such as selection, judging, caring, feeding and preparing for shows.

Shop work includes mechanical drawing and one woodworking project that is usually a tool box. They may go on to have a wood and metal project. The boys have made stools with metal legs. They begin their practice sessions for electric welding—Arc welding.

The Freshman study also includes the study of the fundamentals of electricity. They usually have a lamp project.

To prepare them for using tools, they have Tool Identification to know fitting tools.

At the last of their Freshman year, they have a best choice in projects.

Included in the studies are the FFA activities that they may participate in through the FFA contests and fairs: Livestock Judging, Tool Identifica-

tion, Parliamentary Procedure, Public Speaking and many others.

16 and Over

Mr. Black has included a Tractor Safety Program in his curriculum which is offered in the Freshman and Sophomore classes for students who are 16 years old.

Sophomore Class

Soils and crops are the emphasis in the Sophomore course. This is a Botany type program that leads into soil judging and fertilizing. This combines very well with livestock projects.

In the shop they work with woods, metals and welding. Their wood projects may include the construction of saw horses. They take advanced welding which includes acetylene welding and acetylene cutting. They have more freedom in picking projects.

Mr. Black said he introduced transit work during the Sophomore year. They learn the use of a transit and learn differences in elevation, running grades that they can use in running an irrigation ditch or pipeline—laying the foundation of a small building.

FFA activities include becoming Chapter Officers, and voting on public speaking and parliamentary procedures.

Junior Year

In the Junior year, Mr. Black stresses the technical basis of livestock diseases and technical feeding, balancing of rations. Livestock judging continues.

They study the different breeds, study of genetics to include cross breeding. Here stress is on efficiency of production.

When enrollment is not so great the Junior and Senior classes are run together. They spend more time welding. They go ahead on their own projects which are becoming more sophisticated and may include stock racks, trailers and repairing farm machinery. They make small motor repair and do elementary electrical wiring. They learn management phase of livestock, crops and shop.

Mr. Black also has an 8th grade shop class.

STU Graduate

Mr. Black graduated from Brigham Young University and has done graduate work at Oregon State.

"His boys" have won their share and more of trophies and banners at contests, district and state as well as at county fairs and stock shows.

4-H Leaders Forum Planned at BMCC

Leaders from eight counties will gather at BMCC March 27 to learn more about 4-H Youth Opportunity Unlimited in Oregon.

The four events will include such special speakers as E. Joe Rivers, State 4-H Leader, Jack Pittner of Standard Oil Company, and Mary Abbott, Assistant State Leader.

Workshops on various phases of 4-H and youth development will be a part of the days schedule. Morrow County 4-H leaders will be in charge of hospitality (registration, hosting luncheon and coffee hours).

All leaders are encouraged to attend the session. Pre-registration should be sent to the County Extension Office by March 23.
